At the beginning of this month of February we celebrate the Feast of the Presentation of Christ in the Temple – or Candlemas, as it is more popularly known. We are technically capable of blowing our world to pieces and we currently live daily with the threat of war, even that horrifying prospect, world war.

The words of Jesus are more

But ultimately the One who leads us all is the One in whom we can put our unflinching trust – the God of love who loves all without exception, whether terrorist or saint. Our hope in this God of Love alone can help us face the future with a carefree heart.

New Church Centre and Rectory to be Built After Easter



Building work on the new Church Centre and Rectory in Beauchamp Lane will begin after Easter.

The first phase will be the renovation and extension of Benson Cottage into the new Rectory. The old kitchen is being demolished and an extension to the rear will provide a new kitchen, dining room, and two further bedrooms.

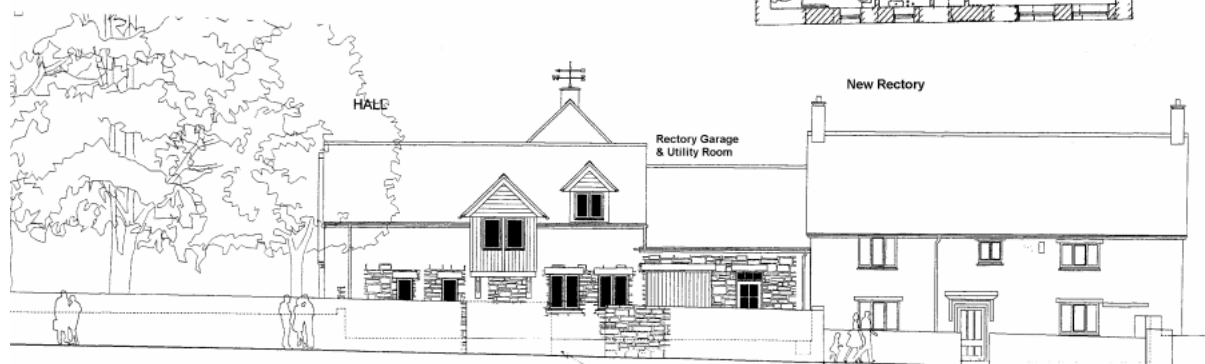
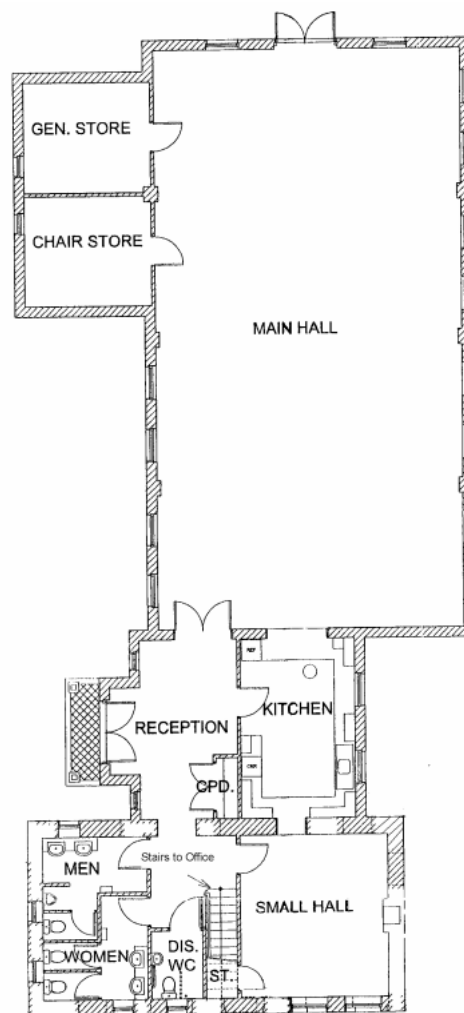
Benson Cottage is a listed building and the new work is in keeping with the existing cottage.

The conversion of the existing "stable block" into a small meeting room with toilets and offices above will take place at the same time as the work on the Rectory.

Once the new Rectory is completed, the existing 1960's Rectory will be demolished, thus enabling work to commence on building of the rest of the Church Centre to the rear of the "old stables".

The final phase of the work, probably next year, will be the building of a purpose-built curate's house and flats on The Hut site.

The existing Parish Hall is in the process of being sold, almost certainly, to another church in the city. Because of a restrictive covenant on the land, all the proceeds from the sale of the Parish Halls will have to be used to build and maintain the new Church Centre in Beauchamp Lane.

Rosanne interviews James Lord

Whilst I look forward month by month to interviewing each of my subjects on your behalf I must say it's a privilege to meet the young people in our parish. As they stand at the crossroads between childhood and adulthood it is interesting to see the world through their eyes. Each has real insight into what they perceive around them. James is no exception. We met one afternoon when snow featured in the weather forecast and, as you will see, this had some input into the conversation.

One of the biggest issues to concern 16-year-old James is the change in Oxford's education system which has caused the closure of his school. He is in the lower sixth at St Augustine's School and is due to leave as the school closes. One would think the effect of this would be minimal. Not so. He remarked on the unsettling and uncomfortable impact the uncertainty has made both staff and pupils. I mentioned how, on my visits to school, I had been struck by the calm and cheerful atmosphere but he believes that I would notice a difference now. Sad.

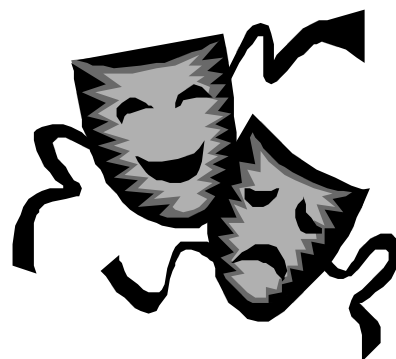
He is studying four subjects at A/S and A level each for a very different reason; English Literature because he enjoys the challenge of a purely academic subject and the need

to read at depth, German because he enjoys languages and thought a "new one" would be a good idea, Business Studies because he thought it would be useful and Chemistry because he loves the practical side of the subject especially making bangs and smells! He is self-deprecating about his sporting achievements. He finds sport fun, wishes he could shine at something and can't. He keeps fit by walking. Each year he joins the St. Francis' pilgrimage led by Fr. John and Clare. He walks to and from school every day and gave up riding his bike ever since he fell off several years ago. He has several provisos about the paths he walks – no stinging nettles and definitely no bees or wasps. Walks on cold winter days are his favourites. Whilst we're on the subject of favourite things I think it's time to highlight his number one passion, namely drama. As a very small boy at St. Francis' School he was given a part in an adaptation of Rudyard Kipling's story 'The Butterfly that Stamped'. It opened up a whole new world for him which he thinks will be his lifetimes' hobby. He is realistic enough to see that it takes more than flair and an attraction to the stage to build a career but he is heavily involved in the excellent productions put on by Musical Youth of Oxford. At his middle school, Temple

Cowley, he performed in some exciting shows including 'Bugsy Malone', 'Oliver' and 'Wind in the Willows' in which he played Badger. He is currently rehearsing with Musical Youth in their forthcoming production 'Me and My Girl' to be staged at the Playhouse at the end of April.

He has plans to apply for university. He has Edinburgh in mind. When I asked him "Why Edinburgh?" he replied that it might snow up there and he might get to make a snowman, something he has never done in all his sixteen years!

Home life in Temple Road with Mum and Dad and his younger brother, William, is good. James attends St. Francis' church with Mum, Lyn, and is on the rota of readers. He says that his natural shyness is under control as a result of his dramatic roles. He is a bit of a perfectionist but finds lack of time scuppers his good



resolutions to be organised. However, he did admit that he can always find a thousand reasons to put off doing something until it becomes pressing. I have certainly found a kindred spirit in this young man.

Was there one particular person who had a strong influence on you as a small child?

This is hard. My Grandma – I asked her all your basic questions like ‘Who is God? What does he do? Why does he let things happen?’ She listened to me. Also my teacher Mrs Van den Else who introduced me to drama beyond your average nativity.

Was there an incident in childhood that you’ll never forget?

Being in ‘The Butterfly that Stamped’.

What sort of child were you?

I was very shy – cried a lot, almost anything would set me off. I’ve never justified violence in the playground. I got my confidence from my friends at school – oh, and acting.

Has your faith always been with you?

I’d say yes. When I doubted and questioned it, it became stronger. I try to think things through rationally and always believed there was Something out there. I think that what happened in the past stays in the past and what is relevant is what happens now.

Which period of your life have you enjoyed most?

To be honest, now. The past is past.

Are there any aspects of modern life you dislike?

Thank goodness you have caught me in one of my optimistic moods. Things to some extent are becoming fairer with regard to world resources and people’s rights.

How do you like to spend your leisure time?

Reading, listening to music and trying to justify why it should not be turned down. I like rock music (a good electric guitar), a good film or friends round for one of mum’s brilliant “spag-bogs”.

What makes you laugh?

I am a Monty Python fan. Anyone who sets himself up to be knocked down is fair game but I don’t like cruel humour.

If you had a magic wand what would you do?

I’d make it snow – LOTS!

If you were not doing what you do now what would be the alternative?

I’d like some professional drama training.

What do you hope to be doing in ten years’ time?

I shall take life as it comes but if possible go into some form of teaching. And I want to own my own bonsai tree*.

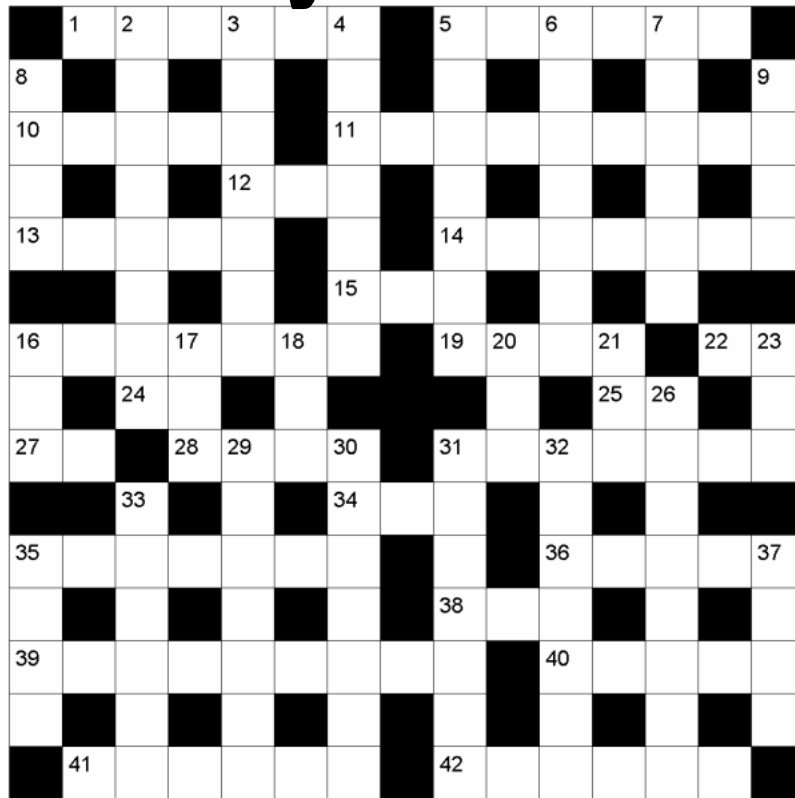
BIG IS BEAUTIFUL, BUT SO IS THE VERY SMALL, SAY CHURCHGOERS

Large churches attract more new members than medium to smaller churches, but churches with very small congregations inspire great loyalty.

So reports Christian Research, who has carried out its Church Attendance Survey for the past ten years in various Anglican and Free churches.

The figures show that between 1989 and 1998, churchgoers who attended the larger churches (those with more than 200 members) increased from 26 per cent of the total number of Sunday worshippers to 40 per cent. But, during the same period, the total of those attending churches whose congregations numbered 100 - 200 dedined by ten per cent. The number of people attending the smallest churches (those with congregations of fewer than 100) remained the same, while many churches with less than 50 people actually grew. Some other findings: the things that draw people to big churches are the relevance of the preaching; the quality of worship; the friendliness of the people, the opportunity to be anonymous if desired; the possibility of 'belonging' to a family; the warmth of the welcome; and the range of children's activities

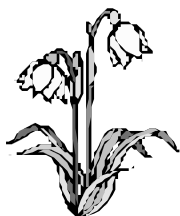
