# From the Editors

It is a busy time during March with both Churches holding their Annual Congregational Meetings – please do support these and nominate people you would like to represent the individual churches on the Church Committees. Lesley Williams has an idea for a trip in May to Nuffield Place, the former home of Lord Nuffield now run by the National Trust, with the opportunity to see the bluebells in the Chiltern – 6<sup>th</sup> or 13<sup>th</sup> May have been offered as possibilities. If you are interested, please look for the “sign-up” form she has put up in the churches.

The monthly cycle rides are continuing, but if walking is more your thing perhaps walking groups would be the answer. A lovely walk from St Francis would be to Shotover – again to see the bluebells but during other seasons as well. “Sign-up” forms asking for those interested and Leaders will be put up in the Churches.

Two other interesting ideas which have been put to the editorial team is:

- ∅ A five-day coach holiday

# A word from the Rectory

A bishop once said "God knows the way ahead. He is just asking us to draw the map as we work our way forward".

Does life ever feel like that? I think it tells part of our story in the coming months. With

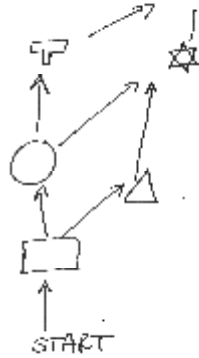
Skye moving on, we are not quite sure what the landscape will be like in the years to come, but we are certain that God will show us the way, and that he will journey with us.

We are the people of God and, therefore, we are the Church. God promises that He will give his Church all that it needs. Some of the gifts we need will come from outside but most will come from us, his body.

As Easter arrives my focus will be turned equally to the needs of St Francis and St James. On Sundays, you can expect to see me alternating between the 10 am service at St James and the 10:30 service at St Francis. It is the role you called me to when I was appointed, to care for the whole parish.

This will have some consequences. We will be even more reliant on good communication and teamwork. We are already thankful for our wonderful team of gifted volunteers. God tells us that each and every one has been given, by God, a gift to build and strengthen the Church. I wonder what gift God has given you?

At some point we are all SEARCHERS, looking for the keys to living a good life. The Christian becomes a follower of Jesus, a DISCIPLE. As we follow Jesus we understand more clearly what a good world will look like. We try to live life the Jesus way. We discover that living life the Jesus



way leads us into serving God and people. In this sense, we become SERVANTS. Wanting the very best for others ends up with us helping them to discover Jesus as a friend and saviour. Because we want the very best for them we end up telling them about Jesus, Church and the Christian life. That is the task of the APOSTLE.

I do not know which of these 4 roles describes you best? Are you a SEARCHER, DISCIPLE, SERVANT, APOSTLE? Or are you a mixture of all of them? Within the Christian family at St Francis and St James we would expect there to be people of each type. To be a healthy church we need: new Christians searching, people simply following, people serving and people teaching others. In a healthy church we are all on a journey growing in faith. As we grow our role changes. Searchers become disciples, Disciples become Servants, Servants become Apostles.

Do you feel a call to do something different? Perhaps you feel a call to find out more about what it means to follow Jesus? To serve Jesus and others. To tell others about the Christian faith. We are going to need more people of every type. And yes, we will need more people to help lead our services, to act as welcomers, readers. Perhaps to lead liturgy, our prayers, or our Children's groups? To make tea, coffee, cake or lunch. Perhaps to preach or consider Ordination?

This Lent ask God where you are on this journey of faith. May he reveal himself to you and may he travel with you.

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# CHURCHES WITHIN OUR DEANERY

## St Mary & St John, Cowley Road, East Oxford



August 1868 saw the creation by Father Meux Benson of a new parish in East Oxford. The church of St Mary & St John was started with the laying of the foundation stone in October 1875. This church was designed by Alfred Mardon Mowbray and was built in instalments, as the money took time to trickle in. Dedication took place on 6<sup>th</sup> November 1883, although the Tower and South Porch were not added until 1893.

Whilst Vicar of the parish, Father Benson also founded a new Religious Order which became known as 'The Cowley Fathers', and some of the members of this Order are buried in the churchyard of this church.

From the beginning, Father Benson wanted a church building which would reflect the work of God in nature and so whilst the church was being built, he made the decision to leave some of the capitals on the pillars and the corbels along the aisles plain, until there was enough money to do the carving justice. Father Walsham How, who was the Vicar in 1928, came to a decision to abandon the aisle carvings and the corbels were also left plain. One of these corbels, by the West Door, can be seen today to still have the scratchings and markings on it, perhaps in the vain hope of ever being completed.

There are many stained glass windows, one of which was designed by Lawrence Lee. It is dedicated to St Frideswide and is in memory of the Headmaster of the Cowley Fathers St John's Classical School. The Chancel has numerous carvings of angels playing musical instruments and will take some time for the visitor to see them all.

This is a very interesting church and, if you are fortunate enough to visit, make sure you have enough time to absorb all the delights of the stained glass, carvings or just the peacefulness of this lovely building.

# A TRUE EXPERIENCE

Last week during the afternoon my telephone system went off. I do not have a mobile anymore because I found it hard to use and nowadays they are so complicated. I have an alarm pendant but that is on the telephone line so I was completely cut off and had anything happened I had no way of summoning help. When my evening carer came she went into action with her mobile.

On my telephones I have 'phone books which means I press a couple of buttons and the person I want is called and my son and daughter are on speed dial. Because of this I have forgotten most of the telephone numbers - I do not even remember my daughter's with any confidence and I do not know my son's since he moved. I did not know who my telephone server was as Simon set it up for me and my bills all go to Rachel.

Both my children have Power of Attorney. I am still in charge but they deal with things for me.

Fortunately I have important numbers on a sheet on the fridge door. My carer was able to ring Rachel and she looked up on her computer my server and my account number and Mary was able to arrange for my 'phones to be restored as an emergency

They were all back on track by mid-morning the next day and my pendant alarm was working, but overnight I had no access to anyone. The list on the fridge has the children's home numbers and mobile numbers and also my doctor's details. I also carry a card with these numbers in my handbag.

I wonder if there is anyone who might think this a

good idea in case of emergency, especially anyone with an alarm.

I also have in my fridge an official document explaining that I do not wish to be resuscitated, and in the same container a list of my medication.

I have only pressed my pendant once in an emergency when I fell and my face was bleeding and I did not know how bad it was. The pendant people sent someone here and sent an ambulance. The first thing the ambulance crew did was to go to the fridge and look inside as well for any information.

While on the subject of illness, it is a good idea to arrange Power of Attorney as one never knows. My husband and I did a joint one and kept it on hold and I was glad to invoke it when he became terminally ill as it meant that I could access his finances being paid. He was under pension age, otherwise I would have had trouble. After he died I did the Power of Attorney with both the children and again kept it on hold until I could no longer cope. Now both the children can access my bank account and can write cheques for me and they have credit cards on my account so that they can buy things I cannot deal with myself, such as a new freezer. Rachel deals with bills, they all go to her, and she pays my carers and deals with financial matters.

I thought after my telephone experience I would air these things so that others can think about arranging the same sort of emergency care.

As a local girl, I attended Cowley St. John Girls School, along the Cowley Road. The Headmistress was known to us as a “part-time” nun and our extensive religious education was taught by the Cowley Fathers Order, so with this background I’ve always been wary of accepting roles that may seem disrespectful to their calling. When I arrived, I was taken to the costume area with another lady and hanging on the rail were two nun’s habits. We were told that the production was a TV series called “The Hustle” where two particular con-men were acting out a bet on “if taken to Central London in their Birthday suits, who would get back to the office first with the most money”. Our role was to re-act as one of the actors ran past us, naked except for a flesh coloured modesty covering.

We were taken just round the corner from the National Gallery. Action! Off we went re-acting with suitable horror. The Director didn’t like that so we tried sideways glances, no wrong again, looking away, no wrong again. By this time, early in the morning though it was, word had got round and to the embarrassment of the actor a small crowd complete with cameras had formed and was getting bigger by the moment. The next time, I was required to be a nun was on Paddington Bear 2, filming in St. Paul’s Cathedral. A security man told me that we had been “wrapped” and the others had gone back to the Hotel over the road to change.

So if you were passing St. Paul’s around midnight last month and saw a shadowy figure crossing the street, I can assure you it was not a paranormal experience but a lost film extra looking for her flock!

- ∅ all of us who shop where Fair Trade goods are for sale.



Grant us an understanding of the impact of our choices.

We ask all these things in the name of Jesus Christ, Amen.

## HURRAH FOR THE CO-OP – AN EXCITING ANNOUNCEMENT

The announcement is genuinely a major one: indicating that by the end of May 2017 the Co-op would become the first UK retailer to use only Fairtrade cocoa across its entire own-brand product range. This affects [over 200 products](#), including everything from chocolate bars to the sprinkles on its doughnuts to the battering on frozen fish (*chocolate on frozen fish? that's interesting information!*). The retailer [estimates](#) that the increased usage will see a five-fold rise in its purchasing of cocoa on Fairtrade terms, and [will create](#) £450,000 a year in social premium payments for cocoa communities, in addition to the payment of the Fairtrade price.

The Co-op's Fairtrade strategy manager, Brad Hill, [noted](#) that the switch had been made possible by the retailer's "working hard with the Fairtrade Foundation to produce a successful 'retail ready' version of the Fairtrade Cocoa Sourcing Programme". The company's own-brand chocolate will continue to bear the FAIRTRADE Mark, as it will use not only Fairtrade cocoa but also Fairtrade ingredients wherever this is possible. For other products, where the cocoa is the only Fairtrade ingredient, the assumption is that the Co-op's labels will use the Fairtrade Cocoa Sourcing Programme logo, which allows manufacturers and retailers to note the Fairtrade Cocoa element of a product without going fully Fairtrade.

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# Can this really be Spring?

New wellies on, on the milder days of February I have been out doing the urgent early season jobs. On the allotment, the autumn-fruiting raspberry canes have been cut down. The summer ones have had last year's canes removed, leaving the canes that grew last year to produce fruit this summer. Autumn raspberries fruit on the current year's growth. After the chop, I gave them some sulphate of potash to, hopefully, give lots of lovely raspberries this year. A crop we are waiting for, is in a netting cage and soon will produce purple sprouting broccoli.

In the front garden, the ladder has come out for me to prune the wisteria. I had a superb show of flowers last year. All the wispy bits are cut away to 2 or 3 buds so all the energy will go into these to produce the gorgeously scented hanging racemes that we will see in May.

Well, that job more than half-filled the brown bin and then I carried on in the back to tackle the buddleia. I find it amazing that it can produce up to 6-foot long straight woody branches in just a few months. This plant is white-flowered and looks like an exploding firework when fully in bloom. The cut off growth provides me with more than enough sticks to act as row markers on the allotment.

I have been a busy bee tidying the shed and washing the dirty pots that were hanging around since the end of last year when it was too cold to wash them. I have a routine now during the season to keep on top of the dirty pot problem. I have a plastic bin and a brush ready and waiting under

the tap of one of the water butts and, whenever I have dirty pots, they go in that bin and I wash them before the pile gets too large.

In the autumn I took up some gladioli and was hoping to store them over winter as I was going flat out planting lots of spring bulbs in the borders. I discovered that the lovely plump corms that I had hung in the shed, had rotted and had gone mouldy. So I have bought some more which I will plant in March to replace them. I will leave them in the ground in future! Looking around the garden, any plant that could be divided is being potted on in preparation for the Plant Sale. I hope you gardeners are doing that too.

I have also cleaned the greenhouse and already I have shallots and onions starting off in modules waiting for the Other Half to clear ground on the allotment. Seed potatoes are chitting in trays near the loft window.

I have been sorting out my seeds and I will soon be booting up my electric propagator with my first sowings. So the new season begins. I hope we do not go back and have any periods of wintery weather to hold everything back as I want a bumper lot of healthy and well-grown plants ready for the Plant Sale on 13th May.

Captain Colton was unable to come and give his lecture on Burmah, but his place was well filled by Mr. Henry Taunt, who gave an excellent account of the great American Exhibition, and exhibited with his powerful magic lantern a great many of the chief places which an Englishman would visit on his way to the World's fair. The proceeds amounted to £4.4s., which will be given to the new building at Temple Cowley.

# A New Look Mothering Sunday at St James:

This year, as we open our doors, we want everybody to feel warm welcome. It is a day when we welcome all to celebrate motherhood. Mums past, present and future.

**What?** Our main 10 am slot at St James will be divided into 2 sessions;

10 am: A 45-minute Family Mother's Day Service (Songs Bible readings, prayers and a talk)

Following a short break (and for those who wish it) Communion will be available. This will include a confession and the Eucharistic prayers. It is designed to follow on from the earlier service.

**Why?** As a church who believes in hospitality we want people to feel welcomed. Our Communion Services are brilliant for those who are used to them, but the majority of the people who live around us know very little about the Christian faith. An occasional service without communion allows them to come and join us and feel part of all that is going on. The welcome we offer at these services is very important. So we need to make sure that those who come to family service but not the Communion feel that they are not missing out. I hope most of the congregation will be willing to forgo communion for the week. This will mean that a full welcome can be experienced by those joining us for coffee in the centre. Having a simpler service should make it easier for us all to invite non-church going friends.

**Invitation?** If we are to get more than our usual people to our Mother's Day Service, we will need to invite them. As the month progresses there will be invitations you can pass out or pop

through doors. A good way to use them is to:

- ∅ Think about who you would like to invite
- ∅ Pray for them daily over the next couple of weeks (there is a suggested prayer on this page)
- ∅ In the week before the 26<sup>th</sup> March - Mother's Day: At best, find an opportunity to pass onto them the invitation, *or*,
- ∅ simply pop the invitation through their door.
- ∅ In the days that follow, if you get a chance, encourage them to come along
- ∅ And continue to pray for them up until Mother's Day.

May God, bless you as you strive to make people welcome!

# CHRISTIAN AID - LENT ARTICLE

“He has told you, O mortal, what is good; and what does the Lord require of you but to do justice, and to love kindness, and to walk humbly with your God?” (Micah 6:8).

For Christians around the world, Lent is a time of reflection, self-examination and thinking of others who are less fortunate. It is a journey, a time for us to think about how we follow the Jesus who calls his disciples to sacrificial loves that breaks down barriers, builds bridges, demands justice for those who find themselves living in poverty.

People like Michael.

Michael lives in South Sudan, where 6.1 million people urgently need humanitarian aid as a result of the conflict that erupted in December 2013. Ongoing fighting has displaced 2.4 million people, and up to 5.3 million people are at risk of severe food shortages.

Michael, who is in his 70s and has gradually lost his sight during the past five years, fled alongside his family when government forces came to his village. Soldiers killed people and stole cattle, forcing Michael to flee to the swamp where he resided with his family for two months. When they returned, most of their belongings were gone, and they were left with next to nothing.

Thankfully, they had some fishing hooks and nets from Christian Aid. Already a skilled fisherman, now Michael can take the younger generation to the swamp to teach them how to fish, so they can continue to feed their community.

Throughout Lent, we are reflecting on the hymn written for us, ‘When I Needed A Neighbour, You Were There’.

We are asking you to reflect each day on the blessings in your life through our Prayer Diary *Count Your Blessings*, inspired by daily opportunities to give, act and pray for communities like Michael’s, helping them to find a safe place to call home.

Christian Aid is working with people displaced within South Sudan, who are living in some of the hardest-to-reach places, to provide much-needed food, safe water and sanitation facilities and essential household items, including sheeting for temporary shelters, as well as fish hooks and nets so they can start to rebuild their lives and become self-sufficient.

Just £15 could provide fishing gear for a family like Michael’s; £8.50 could provide two cooking pots so they can eat a hot meal; and £3 could pay for two plastic jerry cans so they can store safe drinking water.

For 70 years, Christian Aid and its supporters have been there, making a difference, helping to transform the lives of people living in poverty. Will you help us be there, restoring dignity to people in desperate situations, offering hope to brothers and sisters who have no safe place to call home?

## Goldfinches

Keep an eye open for Goldfinches in your garden this spring. Goldfinches are becoming more common. They love niger and black sunflower seeds and can be seen to use their pointed beaks to pluck seeds from teasels and thistles.

They are absolutely beautiful with a red and white head with a black ruff, buff back and stomach with gold and black tail feathers.

The collective noun for goldfinches is a "Charm". Apt, because it is a charming bird.

Legend has it that a goldfinch plucked the thorn from the brow of Christ on the cross to ease His suffering. This is said to explain the goldfinch's red face and why it often appears in medieval religious paintings.

## RECIPE

Food in season in March:

Sardines, blood oranges, clams, cockles, kale, mussels, oysters.

Rhubarb is still on the list, together with Asparagus, Cauliflower, Cucumber, Jersey Royal New Potatoes, Purple Sprouting, Broccoli, Radishes, Savoy Cabbage, Sorrel, Spinach, Spring Greens, Spring Onion, and Watercress.



Stargazey pie is one recipe which seems to be recommended for this time of year, but perhaps Venison Casserole would be more inviting during a cold March – this benefits from long slow cooking.

Ingredients (this amount serves 8-10 so reduce ingredients accordingly unless preparing for group):

- 1 tbsp olive oil
- 25 g butter
- 2 onions, diced
- 4 garlic cloves, crushed
- 4 rashers smoked bacon, chopped
- 500 g chestnut mushrooms, halved
- 2.5 kg haunch or shoulder of venison, diced
- ½ bottle red wine
- 400 ml water
- 2 beef stock cubes, crumbled
- 2 tbsp redcurrant jelly
- Salt and freshly ground black pepper to taste
- 50g cornflour
- Punnet redcurrants to decorate
- 6 springs rosemary or thyme, to decorate

Method:

Preheat the oven to 150C/300F/Gas 2.

On the hob, heat the olive oil and butter in a large lidded casserole dish. Add the onions

and cook until softened, but not browned. Add the garlic, bacon and mushrooms and cook for a further minute.

In a frying pan, brown the venison a handful at a time and add to the casserole. When all the meat is browned, add the red wine, water, stock cubes, redcurrant jelly and salt and pepper.

Bring to the boil and stir well. Put the lid on the casserole and place in the middle of the oven - cook for 90 minutes.

Remove from the oven. Make a paste with the cornflour and two tablespoons of water. Add as much of the paste to the casserole as is needed to thicken the sauce - add a little at a time if you are not sure how much you will need.

Transfer the casserole to the hob, and, on a low heat, cook until the gravy has thickened - this will take about five minutes.

Serve with new potatoes and wilted spinach. Decorate each plate with a sprig of rosemary or thyme and a bunch of fresh redcurrants.
