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

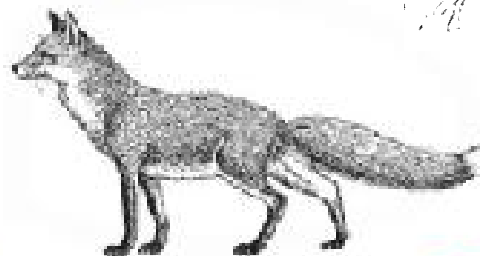

Go on your Baden-Powell Adventure

On Saturday 12th May 2018 to Sunday 13th May 2018, Izzy and I went to Blewbury to complete our Baden-Powell Adventure. We had to be at the Village Hall for 10 in the morning! The theme for this adventure was 'Wind in the Willows'. This is because the author Kenneth Grahame used to live in Blewbury. We did a variety of activities ranging from pond dipping to croquet, the adventure playground and a tour of the village. It was a lovely relaxing weekend and I enjoyed it very much. We met lots of new guiders and had a lot of fun with them. For me the funniest part of the weekend was when the organiser Karen said we were going to get ice cream from the post office next door where she worked. I have never seen anyone including me move so fast. We came home with a badge and a certificate.



Summertime and the livin' is NOT so easy!

My garden was at its best at the end of May with the roses in their abundant first flush and loads of foxgloves, two of my favourite flowers. I have been busy adding to the borders with annuals such as sunflowers, cosmos and dahlias. I regard dahlias as annual as I have a poor track record of being able to over-winter the tubers and of preventing slug and snail attack as they pop up in the spring. I am also popping in the odd tomato plant at the back as I have decided not to grow any in the greenhouse this year. I must admit that they are struggling a bit due to the lack of rain we have had over the last week or two and the fact that we were away for some days. Coming home, the bindweed had had a field day so untwining it and pulling it up was an urgent job.

Another annual I am adding is Cleome or spider flower. It has elegant flowers of white, pink or purple, which look like daddy-long-legs on a tall but elegant stem. I had seeds of all pink flowers which looked great on the allotment last year. I was too late in getting the seeds growing to a size for selling at the Plant Sale but I will be trying to get some for next year. Germination is a bit of a hit and miss affair. The flowers last for a long time going well into autumn. It will replace the height the foxgloves give earlier in the year. Another tall plant is the Verbena bonariensis which I have grown from seed

again this year but I have regrowth from last year's plants too. I should have some for next May's Plant Sale.

Today, on the allotment, I have been constructing a Heath Robinson affair of a netting cage to cover my new strawberry bed, to the scoffing derision of my Other Half! I don't care if it looks mad as long as it can do the job of keeping those pesky pigeons off. I had to replace four plants as they had been pulled up by the birds after the first fruits.

Talking of fruit, I have been picking our early raspberries and the red currants are nearly ready. We will soon have peas, broad beans and beetroot to harvest too.

I lost the argument this year that it was time to dig up our first spuds. Three plants yielded few tubers so we will wait a little longer for our own early potatoes. Meanwhile the Other Half was in "I told you so" mode!

We are in for continuing dry conditions so watering will be needed. So early evenings on the plot with the watering can is a delight in the summer while other folks are stuck in with the World Cup. Mind you, when the tennis starts.....

Come down to the Elder Stubbs Festival on Saturday 18th August.

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SAFEGUARDING

As Christians, we are all of course committed to protecting and safeguarding children, young people and vulnerable adults; we are on track in ensuring that all our current Parish officers and volunteers who have regular contact with or the chance to influence children, young people or vulnerable adults or who have access to confidential information or who visit parishioners in their homes comply with the latest Anglican training requirements.

There are just a few people who still need to follow the Basic awareness course (C0) so there will be one more group session at St James Centre – date yet to be set – Lesley Williams will contact you.

The Foundation course (C1) can be taken on line at home and it is a much better presentation than the C0, which thankfully is due to be revised, but there will also be a face to face delivered C1 on Saturday 7 October, 10.00 - 12.30 at St James Centre, organised through the Diocese. All those who must take this qualification – children and young people's workers, those visiting homes on behalf of the Parish, Church Wardens, leaders of group activities – are asked to diary this and keep it free and sign up when requested. We will also be inviting other local and Deanery churches.

In the future, all new volunteers for the Parish will be required to complete some forms and take the C0 course. Anyone else who recognises that Safeguarding is everyone's responsibility is welcome to study a course – speak to Lesley Williams, Parish Safeguarding Officer.

Positive Disagreement or Negative Distrust

Oxford is full of small 'study centres' where academics hide away to research everything from astronomy to xenophobia. Since I have lived in Cowley I have discovered quite a few of these and am always interested to find out exactly what they do. Most of you will know St. John the Evangelist Church on Iffley Rd. which now serves as the chapel for St. Stephen's House theological college and hosts a whole range of concerts and art exhibitions under the umbrella of SJE Arts. But if you look a little more closely at the signs by their entrance you will see one that says, "Solomon Academic Trust: Centre for Muslim-Christian Studies". As I now find myself serving as the chair of the board of Solomon Academic Trust let me introduce you to this centre.

Originally established in Edinburgh, this study centre moved to Oxford ten years ago and found a home on Iffley Road. The creative idea was to bring Muslim academics and Christian academics together in one place to study together and to teach students together. Does this mean that the Muslim and Christian scholars are finding that they actually agree about everything. Definitely not. That was not the plan. The beliefs of Muslims are very different from our Christian beliefs. But they are finding ways in which they can disagree positively – if that makes sense!

We live in a world constantly threatened by wars that grow out of suspicion and distrust. They also grow out of a lack of understanding of each other. Many of these wars are be-

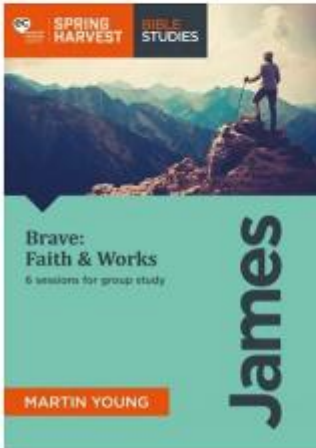
tween people of different faith communities, Muslims and Christians, Hindus and Buddhists, Jews and Muslims. The vision of this small study centre just outside our parish is to overcome this negative distrust, to help us all to disagree with each other in a positive peaceful way, and to enable greater cooperation so that together we can build a better world for the next generation.

So what do they actually do? Well some of the time our staff hide away in their studies, read ancient books (often in Arabic or other languages), write their own books and deliver academic seminars (that I do not understand!). But that's only the beginning. That leads on to much more interesting things like briefing the British Army before they go to serve in Muslim countries so they understand the context in which they are working, talking with groups of six-formers to help them think about how they can relate to people of another faith at college or at work, or advising a mission organisation about how it can most effectively present the good news of Jesus in any context.

The work of the Centre for Muslim-Christian Studies is a long-term project. It will not stop wars tomorrow but our vision is to influence a new generation and to build understanding, tolerance and respect which will shape a better world for us all. 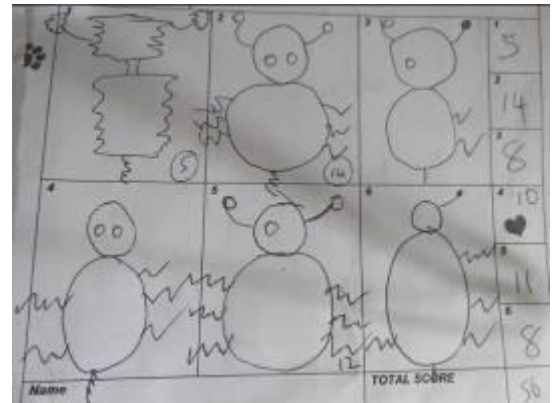
"p-l-e-a-s-e give me a 6"

RECIPES

SODA BREAD

Ingredients

170g/6oz self-raising

wholemeal flour

170g/6oz plain flour

½ tsp salt

½ tsp bicarbonate of soda

290ml/½ pint buttermilk

Method

1. Preheat the oven to 400F/200C/Gas 6.
2. Tip the flours, salt and bicarbonate of soda into a large mixing bowl and stir.
3. Make a well in the centre and pour in the buttermilk, mixing quickly with a large fork to form a soft dough. (Depending upon the absorbency of the flour, you may need to add a little milk if the dough seems too stiff but it should not be too wet or sticky.)
4. Turn onto a lightly floured surface and knead briefly.
5. Form into a round and flatten the dough slightly before placing on a lightly floured baking sheet.
5. Cut a cross on the top and bake for about 30 minutes or until the loaf sounds hollow when tapped. Cool on a wire rack.

The following is (from Cakes, Bakes, Puddings and Prayers by Susan Over).

ANGEL FRUIT TARTLETS

INGREDIENTS:

Pastry cases:

175g (6oz) plain flour

75g (3oz) butter

50g (2oz) caster sugar

1 egg yolk

Fillings:

175g (6oz) mascarpone cheese



1 tablespoon caster sugar

1 level teaspoon finely grated orange zest

Various prepared fruits eg halved seedless grapes, tinned mandarin segments, sliced fresh strawberries or raspberries, tinned or fresh pineapple pieces

Apricot jam, sieved if necessary, for glaze.

METHOD:

1. Preheat oven to gas mark 5/190°C/375°F. Lightly grease a shallow 12 hole bun tin.
2. Rub butter into flour until mixture resembles breadcrumbs, stir in sugar.
3. Add egg yolk and enough water to bind into soft dough. Wrap and chill for at least 30minutes.
4. Roll pastry quite thinly and cut 12 pastry circles to fill the tin. Prick bases with a fork and line each case with foil to prevent rising
5. Bake for ten minutes. Remove foil and bake for a further 5 – 10 minutes until golden.
6. Leave tartlets in tin to cool for a few minutes, then remove carefully and cool on wire rack.
7. Beat cheese with sugar and orange zest until smooth, then divide between cases and arrange fruit on top, either using one variety to one case, or a combination in each.
8. Warm a heaped tablespoon of apricot jam with 1-2 tablespoons of water. Brush over fruit (optional).
9. Chill for a few minutes before serving to allow jam to set.

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UNA'S CORNER

COINCIDENCE

I had thought that this month I would write about my confirmation which took place in St John's Church in the Iffley Road, known to all of us as the Cowley Fathers' Church.

When I was about twelve I and my elder brother who was about seventeen were enrolled in the confirmation classes. My young brother was only five and had to wait his turn which caused him great grief. In those days we had a Church Army sister working in the Parish. She was a lovely lady, very small. She wore a uniform in pale grey with pale blue trim. Even her overcoat was in those colours and her neat little hat. She looked very good. She was Captain of the Guide Company. I was in a different company but saw Sister Shields at Guide events and she wore the Guide uniform, other than those occasions she always wore her grey and blue. More recently we have had Church Army sisters. I remember that the last one married the curate and they became RCs and Philip became a teacher. Neither of those sisters wore uniform. The classes were segregated - Sister Shields took the girls in St Luke's and Father Whye took the boys in the Vicarage. There were about twelve of us girls. The boys met in the old Vicarage - a large rambling white stone house about where the flats are now. The Rev George Moore lived there and farmed the Home Farm; when he went the Revd Maurice Beauchamp was appointed Vicar and Father Alec Whye was his curate. I do not remember Father Beauchamp. I do remember an

elderly priest, white haired and rather small. We called him little Mr Drew. He was a house in lieu priest which meant he was provided with a house in return for work in the Parish. He always managed a short Greek quote when he preached. He visited my grandparents often and they were firm friends. In the Chancel of St James' to the left facing the altar there is a loose square of carpet under which is a memorial stone to Father Beauchamp.

I digress. The actual confirmation was a mass affair, all the candidates from the east of the city were confirmed together - I suppose it was what I now know as the Deanery. The services were held in different churches on a rota basis. We were assigned to the Cowley Fathers' Church. There must have been between twenty and thirty of us. At the actual confirmation we all stood in lines at the front of the church and the questions were asked of us all by the Bishop and we answered in unison. The Bishop then progressed through us all, he would place his hands on the head of one candidate, then on the next, then on the third and then pronounce the words of confirmation. He went through all of us like that. It was a bit impersonal. We did not take Communion at that service.

We had one more confirmation class after that and Father Whye took the girls. He slouched across the pew and talked to us. He explained how we took Communion, holding out both hands one resting on the other and then holding lightly to the base of the chalice
