## A word from the Rectory

As we look around we see the needs of the world are great. It is a time when, we as God family, have a wonderful resource that can change the world - Prayer. As members of the Church of England, our Archbishops, and the senior leaders of our land, are urging us to get onto our knees and pray for not just Britain but the world. Later in the Chronicle you will see an extract from a book by Pete Greig. The book includes inspiring stories of prayer and gives us some simple tools to help us pray.

In the coming weeks we will engage with 'Thy Kingdom Come'. It is a movement encouraging us to gather together and pray. To focus on an idea central to the prayer Jesus gave us; that God's Kingdom will come here on earth.

One way to pray is in petition, asking God to help us. As Jesus met Bartimaeus he could have guessed what this blind man wanted, sight. Yet Jesus pauses and says, "What do you want me to do for you?"

You might hear people say that they cannot pray for themselves. Yet Jesus encourages us to do exactly that. In the Garden of Gethsemane he prays for himself. Earlier he tells the parable of the woman who is being mistreated who goes to a judge asking for justice. Jesus tells us that she badgers the judge until he gives her the justice SHE needs. He tells US to do the same in prayer to God the Father. To be persistent in asking. We are called to pray that God's Kingdom will come in our lives. That his character will show in everything we do.

Jesus also teaches us to INTERCEDE for others. As he approached his arrest, trial and

death he prays not just for himself (petition) but for his disciples (intercession). "My prayer is not for them alone. I pray also for those who will believe in me through their message, that all of them may be one". John 17.

We are called to intercede for our world. Why do we pray for God's kingdom to come?

When God's kingdom is here then those in it will find the life in fulness he wants for us. Isn't that what we want for our family, friends, neighbours, schools etc.

If you're wondering where to start? Why not start with an action linked with the word PRAY?

P – Pause ... stop for a moment and know that God is with you.

R – Rejoice ... remember something good to be thankful for

A – Ask ... For something for yourself –  
Petition.

Ask ... For something for someone else –  
Intercession.

Y – Yield ... seek God's help to do God's will in your life.

- ∅ Some is paid to the church by directly from the bank.



Sierra Leone is the world's most dangerous place to become a mum. Every day 10 women die from giving birth. In Sawula district, the community struggle with a clinic which has no electricity and only two delivery beds.

Jebbeh is heavily pregnant but as her baby grows, it's not joy that fills her heart, but fear. When Jebbeh's sister Fatmata went in to labour, there were so few ambulances that Fatmata had no choice but to walk for three hours under the baking sun, to the nearest hospital. The journey was long and with every step Fatmata struggled to keep walking.



Jebbeh told us: 'My sister was crying out with hunger. She died on the side of the road. She never gave birth.'

This Christian Aid Week, together, we can make childbirth safe for mums and babies. Through our gifts and prayers, we can help give the world's poorest mums a chance to live.

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## RECIPES

### Rhubarb Crumble with a difference



#### For the topping:

80g unsalted butter

120g plain flour

70g demerara sugar

50g roasted chopped hazelnuts

#### For the Rhubarb Slice:

325g rhubarb, washed, trimmed and cut into 2cm pieces

120g golden caster sugar, plus 2 tablespoons for the rhubarb

½ teaspoon ground cinnamon

120g unsalted butter, softened, plus extra for greasing

2 large eggs

2 teaspoons vanilla extract

120g self-raising flour, sifted

1 teaspoon baking powder

#### Method

- ∅ For the topping, rub the butter into the flour until the mixture resembles fine bread-crumbs. Stir in the demerara sugar and hazelnuts. Set aside.
- ∅ Heat the oven to 180°C/gas mark 4. Grease and line a rectangular tin, 30 x 20cm, with baking parchment. Place the chopped rhubarb in a bowl and stir in 2 tablespoons sugar and the cinnamon. Set aside.
- ∅ Beat together the butter and 120g sugar until light and fluffy. Beat in the eggs, one at a time, and stir in the vanilla extract. Fold in the flour and baking powder. Spread the batter over the base of the prepared tin. It should be quite a thin layer. Scatter the rhubarb pieces evenly over the batter then cover with the nutty topping. Bake in the oven for 40 minutes until golden and firm to the touch. Remove from the oven and leave to cool for 30-40 minutes. Serve warm or cold.

# From the Archives

## Extracts from the Cowley Chronicle

November 2010

### OXFORD CITY BRANCH OF CHURCH BELL RINGERS

October 2<sup>nd</sup> dawned bright and warm, a perfect autumn day for bell ringing. St James' ringers are part of the Oxford City and District Branch of the Oxford Diocesan Guild of church bell ringers and it was the City Branch's turn to host the annual 6 bell striking competition. The Oxford Diocesan Guild stretches from Burford in the west to Ivinghoe in the east, and Claydon in the north to Sandhurst in the south and comprises many, many ringers and dozens of towers.

Every ten years or so, the City Branch has to host the competition and we chose St James as the venue because the church rooms are the best in the area – and the bells are just tricky enough to ring to set the most accomplished ringers a bit of a challenge.

There were nine teams with some very experienced ringers taking part. The judges were safely shut in the church noting every little trip and error that the ringers made, while the competing bands listened intently to every piece of ringing. There was plenty of time to enjoy the delicious spread provided by the Cowley ringers, copious cakes, sandwiches and refreshing cups of tea.

The local band came third, which was not a bad effort but not good enough to beat the band in second place from Shrivenham, or the winners from Drayton St Leonard whose lovely ringing really deserved to win the cup.

The competition will not be held in Oxford again for quite a while – perhaps next time St James' very own band, with Jamie in charge, will take the trophy?

### CELEBRATIONS AT ST FRANCIS

At long last our Anniversary Day had arrived, the months of planning were over, and it was time for action. Soon after 2 pm a small band of dedicated workers arrived, and pitched in with a will. Our church was swept and cleaned, hoovered and polished until everything shone and gleamed in the afternoon sun. (How fortunate we were to have such a lovely day

for our festivities). Chairs were carefully placed in position, the Order of Service Sheets placed on the table in the vestibule. Patrick and Howard went through the service together and wisely rehearsed things. Parishioners began to arrive with contributions of food for our bring-and-share supper. There was an air of expectancy and excitement everywhere. A number of us rushed home to have a wash and brush up and put on our best clothes.

As the light faded and the darkness grew, we returned to take our places in the congregation. And it seemed as if the heavenly bodies were united with us, for, as we looked through our round East window, we saw a full moon shining brightly in the night sky. The visiting clergy arrived and quickly robed. The bell sounded for the commencement, the organ swelled into mellow tones, we all rose together to a man, and the service began.

As I looked around me at the congregation, and the colour and the spectacle, I felt suddenly very proud of our little church of St Francis and of the people who worshipped there. In church terms our anniversary was quite a short one, a number of churches have celebrated a thousand years of history. Yet it was important to us, and we remembered its turbulent beginnings at the time of the great depression of the 1930s and the beginning of the Second World War. The congregation then must have been very anxious, and as they witnessed the terrible bombing of nearby London and Coventry, must have wondered just how long their church would last. Yet last it did, and we were there to celebrate the fact.

Our special service was largely put together by Patrick, our organist, and fitted the occasion while still being in the context of Lent. We started with the Hymn "All creatures of Our God and King" which was entirely appropriate, since the words are adapted from St Francis – Canticle of the Sun. There was a part for everyone in the service, choir, congregation and clergy. We all had words to say and responses to make. Julian Hubbard, our Archdeacon, gave the address and reminded us that it was also Red Nose Day and recalled St Francis' early struggles to obey his Lord's command to "Rebuild My House". He spoke of his affection for our church and said that he always enjoyed coming back to St Francis.

Of all the prayers that were said, I think I liked the one read out by Richard Chand, that went as follows:

Almighty God

To whose glory we celebrate


The dedication of this house of prayer  
We give you thanks for the fellowship  
Of those who have worshipped in this place;  
And we pray that all who seek you here may find you,  
And be filled with your joy and peace;

We arranged that it should be cut by the oldest member of our congregation Eleanor Bradbury, who is 93 years old.

I think that everyone who joined us on this special day really enjoyed themselves and we all went home, tired but happy.

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
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## AN EXTRACT FROM PETE GREIG'S BOOK: HOW TO PRAY



Pete heads up the charity 24-7 prayer.

INTERCESSORS ARE THOSE WHO 'STAND BEFORE GOD IN THE GAP ON BEHALF OF THE LAND'

....., just a few days ago I heard from Jonathan, a member of our church who works in London and arrived very early for a meeting in Westminster one morning in August. As he walked across the River Thames on Westminster Bridge towards the Houses of Parliament with two and a half hours to kill, he found himself thinking back to the terror attack that had taken place there the previous year. As he did so, he sensed a new and imminent danger so powerfully that he began to pray for protection (not something he would usually do), and continued pacing those streets and praying for an hour. 'It was so strange and so strong,' he recalls. 'I walked and prayed around that area praying for the safety of those who work in Parliament and the offices nearby, the hospital over the bridge, and the crowds of commuters. Eventually, around 7:30 a.m., I stopped praying and stepped into a coffee shop near the bridge. It was just seven minutes later and one hundred yards from where I was sitting that a terrorist drove his car into cyclists and pedestrians in the precise place where I'd been praying between Westminster Bridge and Parliament.' We will never know for sure, this side of eternity, what difference Jonathan's prayers made that day. But what we do know is that the attack on Westminster Bridge the previous year left fifty people injured and five dead, but this incident killed no one and left three people with only minor injuries.

Those three injured people received assistance within seconds of the attack because the vehicle immediately behind the terrorist's car just happened to be an ambulance. What's more, CCTV footage revealed that the terrorist had been driving round and round these very streets in the hour before the attack, as Jonathan had been walking them, sensing danger, praying for protection against precisely this kind of attack. And there's one more remarkable 'coincidence' – Jonathan's wife Linda had woken unusually early that morning

(something she would never normally do) with an urge to pray for him on his walk to work. It was strange because he commutes to work every day in another part of London, and she'd forgotten he had anything special on that day. The Bible describes Joshua overcoming a direct enemy attack while Moses, supported by Aaron and Hur, prayed for victory. Perhaps on that day in London something a little similar took place when an ordinary commuter's prayers, supernaturally prompted, seem to have been used to neutralise impending evil, with the support of his praying wife at home.


## ELECTORAL ROLL

3 more people have been added since then: if you missed the registration period, you can now be included – the forms are available in both churches, to be returned to Lesley Williams, Electoral Roll Officer.



# St James Church Toilets and Entrance

Over many years we have been talking about the need for a toilet in St James Church. We managed to secure a small grant to fund a feasibility study to look at how this might take place. Working with our Architect we have come up with two options. Both involve getting the church onto mains drainage. Both envisage it being sited under the organ loft at the back (west end) of the Church. Both plans will allow continued access to the bell tower and the back of the Church organ, the latter for maintenance purposes. We are currently waiting on proposals for the connection to main drainage. Once these have arrived we can start to think about costs etc. Your thoughts on the plans below will be much appreciated. 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## UNA'S CORNER

Continued from the April edition:

The land opposite Cowley Centre has a long history. Way before my time, the site was occupied by a company who made steam ploughs. There is an archway with their name, together with a relief picture of a steam engine on it which still stands at the corner of Rymers Lane and Between Towns Road. This was taken down, brick-by-brick and re-erected by the developers of the John Allen Retail Centre. The reason for this is because it originally stood at the entrance to the factory and would have been in the way of the new entrance to the car park.

The company, as I understand it, was then bought out by Mr John Allen, who was a very well-known and respected gentleman in Cowley. He took over the company and made farm implements. I am not sure when he died, but his son then took over. His name was Cullimore Allen and he continued with the factory making farm implements until it was bought by Grove Cranes. One of the items they manufactured was the 'John Allen Motor Scythe' which became quite famous.

In the centre of the factory there used to be a square playing field with beautiful green grass and as flat as a billiard table which enabled wise use of sport. The farm implements used to stand round that plot of grass. There was also a line of beautiful tall trees along Between Towns Road. I am not sure if it was Grove Cranes or not, but I remember on one Bank Holiday this line of trees began to be dismantled. Whoever it was knew that they would not get permission and hoped to get them down before they were stopped. They did not get very far. Still, they did cut down quite a few and anyway that site became a shopping centre.

The older Cowley people still call it the John Allen Centre, I certainly do. The shops were built and the beautiful green plot was turned into a car park. There was a large B & Q stores backing onto Rymers Lane with a lovely gardening section and that is where the new hostel for the homeless is being built now. The shops have continued to change over the years.

The third shopping centre in Cowley is up by the ring road roundabout. Its official title, I think, is Oxford Retail Park. There were houses there once and my maternal grandparents, when they first came to Oxford lived in a house called Holman Dean. That house was just about all there was and stood at what is now the entrance to the centre. This Shopping

Park is well used although some of the shops including Mothercare have closed. Unfortunately, the bigshot Tesco's is there. They have a large petrol station on site. There is also a Marks & Spencer's food shop, a Next, large Boots store and a sports shop and, I believe, a Burger Bar. There are a lot of car parking spaces but some of them are a fair distance from the shops. Two entrances serve this Retail Park, one at the by-pass roundabout and the other which leads from Garsington Road via a path to the underpass.

All three of the shopping centres in Cowley are new within my lifetime, or indeed within my sons' lifetime. We had a lovely Woolworths at Cowley Centre and we do miss that, but there is now a Post Office again, which is very useful and stores in the centre. Around the front there are Food Takeaways along with Wetherspoons.

The new buildings going up at the Barracks and Between Towns Road with those opposite Cowley Centre will create business for the new shops coming in, so I hope very much that both old and new shops will survive.

With all the shops in Cowley there is no proper toyshop, ironmongers, haberdashers or craft shop, which is a pity. On the whole, though, I think we are pretty well served. There is a new Lidl's open on Garsington Road, but that is too far for us to go with my wheelchair. There is an Aldi along the bypass which is quite a way, but we do go there sometimes although one of the other few shops there is under threat.

Shopping has changed so much in my lifetime for, when I was a child, a shopper would have to go to different counters in the same shop to buy different things. For instance, you could buy cheese and butter at one and pay for it and then go to another counter to buy biscuits and bread, pay for *them* and so on. This could involve up to perhaps three or four counters, but now of course, it's all self-service and you pay for everything at the same time.

Hygiene was also very different then and I remember a shop with open sacks of dried peas and rice and all that sort of thing. The shopkeeper would come and weigh out what you wanted and put it into a bag. It was all open to the atmosphere and wouldn't be tolerated nowadays.

Also, the shops specialised, with a butcher cutting up the meat in front of you. It wasn't all cellophane and plastic wrapped then. I remember fish being laid out on a marble slab with ice scattered over to keep it cool. I think they still do that at the covered market. Greengrocers only sold fruit and vegetables. Back then clothes shops would only sell clothes and there were no clothes *departments* in food shops. The Post Offices were usually Crown establishments in towns, not a counter in a shop. Sometimes it is hard to remember what it was like then, very different to today's shopping.

## "DON'T BE MEEN" - HONESTY IN A PRAYER SPACE

*Just before Easter our churches hosted students from our three primary schools to explore prayer and the Easter story. Prayer spaces are one of my favourite things to do, and, I believe, one of our parish's most important ministries - we share with children our faith in a God who loves them unconditionally, and then show them ways they can have a relationship with him - how cool is that!*

*I have been involved with prayer spaces for over eight years, below are some of my reflections about prayer and honesty.*

One of the things I love about prayer spaces in schools is that you never quite know what is going to happen.

They say you should never work with children or animals, probably because they don't always do as they're told! But this unpredictability is the very thing I enjoy most about being around children. There is a certain 'danger element' about opening up a conversation with a group of 10 year olds and just running with wherever it leads, and in prayer spaces this is where my faith in the Holy Spirit is tried and tested.

Giving children space to express themselves freely is one of the really good things about a prayer space. I have heard some theological truths and some profound statements of faith from primary school children, and these have taught me more about God than all of my tutors at theological college. However, I would be fibbing if I were to say it is always like that.

Thank you God for boobs...

One of my favourite prayer space moments was with a Year 4 class - the children were making things that they were thankful for out of playdough. One of the volunteers and I were sitting with the children and talking about what they were making. There were pets and food - always popular 'thank you' things - and one child was making his mum. As we watched, his playdough started to take the form of a rather shapely woman, complete with all the bits that shapely women have. Another student noticed and pointed and laughed, saying loudly, 'Ha! Look at your mum's BOOBS!'

The volunteer and I shared a glance and decided, 'Let's go with it'

The volunteer is a paediatric nurse who is extremely gifted with children, and who, like me, likes to live on the edge! 'Well,' I said, 'does anybody know what boobs are actually for?'

There then followed a surprisingly sensible conversation about mammals and breastfeeding.

'So,' I concluded, 'Boobs are actually a good thing to say thank you to God for, because boobs are for feeding babies.'

Kik me: visions for a new world...

The primary school's value for the term was peace, and I was really keen to hear the students' responses in the [New World](#) activity - If you were in charge, what rules would you have? What would you change, and what would you keep the same?

Themes of justice came up time and again, and the students' rules regarding fair play and equality were something we could all aspire towards. I was feeling very proud of a group of Year 3 boys who had a brilliant conversation about treating other people how they would like to be treated. They wrote down their thoughts on Post-its. Joshua finished first and stuck 'Don't be meen' up on the wall. He then looked thoughtfully down at the felt pen and blank pad of Post-its in his hand, then wrote 'Kik me' and stuck it to his friend's back.

One of the aims of the prayer spaces is to get across the message that we don't have to put on our 'church face' to pray. It doesn't matter how we feel, God always wants us to share what we are doing with him, even if it is a bit naughty! The key for any prayer space leader is a willingness to go with the flow, respond to what is happening, and to trust that God will do the rest.

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## HELP THE HEDGEHOG!

Hedgehog numbers have fallen by 30% in the last 10 years

Here's what you can do in your garden to help the Hedgehog.

1. Make sure hedgehogs have easy access to your garden. Leave gaps at the bottom of boundary fences or hedgehog holes (13cm x 13 cm)
2. A wild corner offers shelter, protection and natural food.
3. Provide a shallow dish of fresh water and food such as meat based pet food or chopped unsalted peanuts for hedgehogs.
4. Avoid using pesticides and slug pellets. Not only can these harm hedgehogs, but also damage their food chain.
5. Check thoroughly for hedgehogs before strimming or mowing.
6. Check bonfires carefully and remove sleeping hedgehogs before lighting.
7. Keep pond and pool water levels topped up, providing a gently sloping edge if possible or place half submerged rocks in the water as an escape for hedgehogs.
8. Keep pea netting 22-30cms (9-12") off the ground so hedgehogs can pass safely.
9. Make or buy a hedgehog home, it may be used as a hibernation site in winter, or as a nesting box for a mother and her hoglets in the warmer months.

My "platforms" comprise of a couple of sheets of plastic roofing and an old metal bed frame supported by various upturned buckets. They do the job but the lawn has to wait to be cut underneath.

I want to say a BIG THANK YOU to all those lovely people who have given me pots and to those who are also growing on and potting up for the sale. Similarly, a massive THANK YOU in advance for all the helpers on the day, the cake bakers, preserves makers, kitchen helpers, raffle prize givers.....

We hope for good weather and good fun. The proceeds this year will go to the FLUSH fund to help pay for a long-needed, accessible loo for St James' Church. The boring stuff, making a sewage connection, is going to need a lot of dosh!

Finally, as with all previous Plant Sales, I have not paid for any plastic pots but have re-used

those that I had or those that have been given to me. I'd hate to see any going to the Energy Recovery Facility at Ardley which is where all our non-recyclables go to be incinerated to make electricity. At least it's not landfill any more. I will put out a bin for pot returns for the week after the Plant Sale. Let's recycle!

As for "Edible Britain", I shall be bringing lots of veg – tomatoes, chillies, courgettes, pumpkins, beans, cabbages .....
