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A word from the Rectory: Living in changing time!

If you look elsewhere in this month's Chronicle, you will find a script for a very short drama. It is based on part of one of St Paul's first letters. It talks about us being the 'Body of Christ'. In this sketch, a not particularly well working body tries to start a new day. As you will read, things do not go very well! That is just not us. We have just had our Annual General Meetings. When we look through the 'Annual Report' we see a group of people that are working together to be Jesus' family, his body. But as times change, needs also change. With Revd Skye moving on we become a body with a different shape. The valued things Skye did, need to be done by somebody else. These are some words from our diocesan web site.

"All Christians are called to serve Christ in every aspect of their lives – at home, in their work, in the church. Theologians debate at what point discipleship becomes ministry, but we don't need to worry about that here!"

There are a range of ministries which are authorised by the incumbent and/or the local church. These include most work with children and young people, much pastoral work, leading home groups, running the choir or music group, and many other things. It is up to the local church and person concerned whether any training is undertaken."

In the coming months, we are going to explore how this permission to serve each other can work out. It is nothing new. Sitting amongst you are people who have, and still: preach, lead services, visit the sick and house bound, pray for each other and strangers.

We believe in a generous loving God who gives to His Church all the things that are needed not only to survive but to have that life in fullness that Jesus talked about.

As a church, we have so many gifted and talented people. For us the challenge is to recognise the gifts that Jesus has given to each person. We are

then challenged to help them to grow and use them. It is really quite exciting!

So if you see me nudging people to do something differently, don't be surprised. Can I guarantee things will always be perfect? You know me better than that. If we don't make some errors we are probably not pushing the edges hard enough.

What will be helpful is you prayerfully asking where God has hidden the gifts and talents that we need. BUT also talking to me about how you think God wants his family to be like in this part of Cowley and Headington. Whatever we face let's face it together and with a hand held out for Jesus!

Blood donor extraordinaire . . .

Have you ever heard of a dog being a blood donor? Do not panic, Dog's blood goes to dogs not people.

My stepdaughter is very much in favour of helping in the community and she heard about dogs being blood donors. Obviously dogs which get injured or maybe have surgery could need a blood transfusion urgently to save their lives. Elizabeth found out all about it and persuaded my son and daughter in law to arrange for their dark brown Labrador to become a blood donor. She found a vet who did this, not their vet but not too far away. Off they went with CoCo and tests were done and the dog was healthy and suitable. CoCo was lifted onto a table where she was encouraged to keep quite still, a small patch of hair was shaved on her neck, apparently this is so that they can be sure of missing the jugular. The vet took 450mls of blood, about one pint I think, and the dog lay passive and did not flinch when the needle was inserted.

CoCo has now given blood three times at six month intervals and each time is perfectly calm and good. She is, of course, being a Labrador a big dog so can give that amount of blood every six months with no harm to her.

CoCo wears a special badge on her collar to say that she is a blood donor.



Getting excited about statistics

I have recently been writing a booklet for mission leaders around the world which looks at the ten most important changes in our world which the church needs to be aware of as we go about our mission. (If you would like a copy please just ask me and I can probably find you a free copy if you ask nicely!) For one of the chapters I found myself looking at a lot of statistics. Normally I find numbers quite boring but I got really excited about these so I thought I would share a few of them with you this month.

When you look around church on a Sunday morning what do you think a typical Christian looks like? Well, if you take a look at the whole world the statistics tell us that the most typical Christian today is a young black woman, 24 years old and living on a very low income in a village or poor suburb in either Africa or Latin America – perhaps a little like the woman pictured here. The typical Christian in our parish is also female but that is where the similarity ends!



Fact number two! The year 2014 was very significant for Christians around the world. For the first time in hundreds of years Europe (including Russia) was no longer the continent with most Christians. That year Latin America overtook Europe but they will not be in the lead for long. Before the end of this decade Africa will overtake both Europe and Latin America becoming the largest Christian continent on earth – and Asia is not that far behind. Let me give you the full figures predicted for 2050 – they are:

Africa –	1.2 billion Christians
Latin America –	700 million Christians
Asia –	600 million Christians
Europe (including Russia) –	500 million Christians
North America –	260 million Christians
Pacific (Australia etc.) –	33 million Christians

Why is that so exciting? It means that God's church is growing so fast around the world that in just 30 years' time there will be five times as many Christians in the places where we used to send missionaries (Africa, Asia, Latin America) as there are in Europe. They will be the ones helping us to keep the light of Christ shining in dark places. 'She' may be only 24 and poor but she is one of the 2.5 billion followers of Jesus who will take our faith into the future.

One other statistic that excited me the religious group (like Muslims, Jews, Christians) which is declining fastest in our world today is guess which Atheists! If you want to be in a minority, stop believing in God.

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Getting ready for the thirteenth

The first thing I do every day is to survey my precious charges. Up to the loft to check seedlings in the propagator by the window then down and out to look at plants in the greenhouse and outside in the garden. With an eye to the Plant Sale on Saturday 13th May (notice the advert!), I fret that I will have everything in a saleable state. Do seedlings need pricking out or potted on? Have I sown seeds early enough or too late? Is there any evidence of slug damage? If so, I will search to find the culprit and fling it into the hedge. Am I over-watering or letting them get too dry? It can be very stressful, this gardening lark!

I make sure every pot is labelled as I go along as it saves loads of time just before the sale. I am also thinking of what level of price to give everything but I generally make that decision on the day before.

At the moment, my greenhouse is completely stuffed and we need some decent warm weather to be able to put the hardier plants out in the garden to leave room for expanding numbers of filled pots. The garden table, chairs and wooden bench will all be covered with trays and I also bring out temporary structures for more space. It means that the lawn will not be mowed for a bit as a sheet of plastic roofing supported by up-turned buckets is not easily moved about when also covered with trays of plants. I am sure the sale will go fine! I hope that, as ever, we have enough helpers, loads of plants being brought in, mountains of cakes, jams and marmalades, raffle prizes, bric-a-brac and the hall full of enthusiastic buyers and never-ending cups of tea and coffee!

Down on the allotment, I have managed to put all the onions, shallots and garlic out that were started in modules in the greenhouse. All the seed potatoes are also in the ground as well as broad beans. Two rows of peas and small rows of

seeds of beetroot, spinach, and lettuce have gone in. I am determined this year to be better at successional sowing so more small rows will go out every 2-3 weeks so we don't have uneaten gluts and then a famine.

I have filled in the runner bean trench with annual weeds, remains of sprouting broccoli tops, lawn-mowings and lots of wet newspaper. That lot, covered in soil should, we hope give much-needed moisture to the roots of beans I have yet to sow. I need to set up the bean poles structure for the beans to climb and then I will be ready to sow 2 beans per station on 1st May, which is the traditional day to do so in my family.

Do, please, come and support the Plant Sale on Saturday 13th May. It is usually a busy, but hectic, fun event!

May 1894

NEW SCHOOL AT TEMPLE COWLEY:

The children were assembled with their teachers in the first new room on Monday, 5th March, when the Vicar read some prayers praying God to accept this room. This room has cost £400, and has been paid for, but the other room which is now being built at a cost of another £400 must be subscribed for. Will you send what you can to the Vicar?

Nearly £40 has had to be spent to meet the requirements of the Education Department on the Boy's School. The Bishop of the Diocese has kindly sent us £20 towards this from the emergency fund.

PARISH SCHOOLS:

There seems to be some misunderstanding in certain quarters about the attendance of children. We beg to draw the attention of parents and employers to the following facts:-

No child can leave any of the schools in this parish who has not passed the fourth standard in reading, writing or arithmetic, or who is not over fourteen years of age; or who has not made 250 attendances in not more than two schools during each year for five preceding years whether consecutive or not.

Children must be specially examined by Her Majesty's Inspector for labour certificates.

On Tuesday, May 1st, the children of the Band of Hope had their quarterly tea in the Temple Cowley Schools, and amused themselves with games &c., afterwards. Three prizes were given, to W. King, E. Stotes, and H. Hansford, We are looking forward to their summer outing, and hope our readers will encourage these children. They pay themselves for their quarterly teas, and as they have kept together for five years, we hope you will send a Donation to Miss Robinson, at the School House, for this purpose.

Any of the details can be had from the Vicar, or of Col. Lindsay, or Mr. William Polley, Churchwarden.

Some notes on Gift Aid

You may gift-aid your donations to this Parish and to other charities. It means that the charity can claim an extra 25% on that donation from Her Majesty's Revenue and Customs (HMRC) – the Tax Man.

It is the individual's responsibility to ensure that enough tax has been paid from income. This financial year you do not start paying tax until your income is £11,500 so it might be good to satisfy yourself that enough tax has been paid to cover the tax recovered by the charity. If you do not pay enough tax, please let me know.

The Government, in the last few years, have initiated the Gift Aid Small Donations Scheme. It means that, as the parish treasurer, I can claim 25% on all anonymous cash donations given on the plate at services. The emphasis is on small, cheques and £50 notes don't apply! The scheme also covers small donations in green envelopes from donors who have not given a gift aid declaration. Again, I cannot claim on cheques and £20 or above in one envelope and the top limit to claim is £8,000 per year per church. Our claim in the scheme is nowhere near this level!

Church Treasurers are very grateful for the boost in income that Gift Aid gives and it certainly makes a big difference here in Cowley.

RECIPE

The weather has taken a turn for the worse, and on a cold evening what could be better than

Lamb stew with rosemary dumplings (Serves 4)



Ingredients

For the stew:

750g/1lb 10oz lamb neck fillet, cut into 2.5cm/1in cubes

salt and freshly ground black pepper

25g/1oz plain flour

1 tbsp olive oil 50g/2oz butter

12 baby onions, peeled

2 medium carrots, cut into large dice

1 medium swede, cut into large dice

50ml/2fl oz white wine

2 sprigs rosemary 4 bay leaves

1.25 litres/2 pints lamb stock

3 tbsp flatleaf parsley, roughly chopped

For the dumplings

125g/4½ oz plain flour 65g/2½ oz suet

½ tsp baking powder Pinch salt

1 tbsp rosemary, finely chopped

500ml/18fl oz lamb stock

Method

1. Preheat the oven to 120C/250F/Gas ½.
2. Season the lamb and dust with the flour. Place a heavy-bottom casserole dish over a medium heat, add the olive oil and butter then the lamb. Fry until golden-brown. Remove the lamb and keep to one side.
3. Reduce the heat and fry the onions, carrots and swede until caramelised. Add the wine and simmer until the volume of liquid has reduced by half, then add the lamb back in with the lamb stock. Bring the stew to a simmer then add the bay leaf and rosemary sprigs. Cover with a lid, transfer the pan to the oven and bake for one hour.
4. For the dumplings, mix the flour, suet, baking powder and a pinch of salt in a bowl. Add the chopped rosemary then gradually stir in 3–5 tablespoons of cold water, or enough to form

a sticky dough. Flour your hands and then roll the dough into 12 small balls. Place on a plate in the fridge to chill.

5. When the lamb stew is ready, place 500ml/18fl oz lamb stock into a separate pan and bring to a simmer. Add the dumplings and simmer for 6–8 minutes. Discard the stock when the dumplings are cooked and set them aside to rest for a minute.

One of the postings was to Libya in 1984 at the time of the siege of the Libyan Embassy in London following the murder of WPC Yvonne Fletcher. On that occasion they had to close our Embassy in Libya and leave that country within 48 hours.

Our next meeting is on Wednesday, 17th May at 2 pm, when we shall discuss the Resolutions which are to be debated at the National Annual Meeting being held in Liverpool in June. There will also be a demonstration of flower arranging.

We will also have a supply of envelopes in both churches, which we invite you to take to collect from family, friends and neighbours.



Christian Aid Week: standing with refugees like Nejebar

Nejebar and her family have fled horrors in Afghanistan, where her husband was threatened with torture and death for being a government worker.

But now they've arrived in Greece, all they have is a tent. They have no other protection against wind and rain. There is no school for their five children. And they have no certainty or clear idea of what will happen to them now. They thought they would stay here for 10 days, but it is already been six months and there is no end in sight.

Nejebar's husband Noor describes their initial reaction to arriving in the camp in Greece: 'It was like suicide for us. But we took the decision that it is better to die here than to die there from war.'

You've helped us be there for refugees since 1945

Thanks to you, Christian Aid has been there for refugees like Nejebar since 1945, providing essential food, shelter and legal assistance for people far from home. And we still believe in life before death.

How might I help St Francis School?

From Pat Chambers, our Verger:

Following a recent funeral I received the following letter from one of the people who attended – a letter expressing many happy memories evoked through attendance at a sad occasion:

"I recently met you when I re-visited the lovely St James Church at the funeral of one of my few remaining cousins, Mrs Eileen Wright.

I am now 84 and the last time I attended St James was on my wedding day as a happy 20 year old bride! I remember it was March 14th 1953 and quite a cold day – even a smattering of snow. My bridesmaid was glad of her white fur bolero and flower covered warm muff! (See the photographs below – black and white as there were no colour pictures then). The wedding photos were done by B Saywell on the Cowley Road and are still very good over 60 years later.

It is odd also to remember that television then was very new and very expensive with a tiny screen in a large wooden 'box' and owned by very few people. Our main entertainment was the radio, especially Saturday Night Theatre, where chilling plays were enjoyed by the whole family narrated by the 'Man in Black'. New Theatre shows and pantomimes were also very popular. Great excitement when the Majestic Ice Rink was built and many youngsters cycled to attend – very few owned cars. There were coffee shops but no Mcdonalds or bistros.

Ballroom dancing was very popular and we learned the steps at Bretts School of Dancing where both modern and 'old fashioned' dances were taught. As a teenager I went dancing twice a week at one shilling entrance fee(!) at the Forum and Morris Motors.

I met my husband Raymond Simmons at Morris Motors Accounts Department in 1952 and married a year later to live in Oliver Road with my parents whilst houses were being built in Headington. We moved into a new house in Quarry in 1956 just two weeks before my first daughter was born on March 29th. I must have been a sight to behold standing on a chair hanging new curtains with a large bump!

We furnished this house (where I still live) one room at a time buying furniture from Walkers Furniture Shop in Headington, as did many newly-weds. We could not afford to furnish the whole house like young couples today. Each item was treated with great care and expected to last for at least twenty years.

My maiden name was Marian Ellis. Sadly, I lost my dear husband nine years ago.
