

ST FRIDESWIDE PILGRIMAGE

Friday 18 and Saturday 19 October

Parish of Cowley pilgrims from Abingdon to Oxford on Saturday 19 October were Geoff and Mary Bayliss, David Benskin and Lesley Williams – along with around 60 others.

Jill Ling and Brenda Lee joined the pilgrimage at Iffley Lock and Ed Ling met us at Christ Church. We were 'walking the Beatitudes' with short worship and reflection stops along the way, all scripted in an excellent booklet giving the background to St Frideswide, the concept of pilgrimage and the Beatitudes.

Lesley had also walked from Dorchester Abbey to Day's Lock on the Friday but did not have time to spend the whole day continuing to Abingdon so returned to her car at the Abbey, along with Bishop Colin, who also had a busy day ahead of him.

Five of us enjoyed tea and cake in Christ Church College dining hall (as filmed in Harry Potter) and had a short time to experience the creative prayer stations in the Cathedral based on the Beatitudes, set up by BeSpace before the splendid Pilgrimage service, led by Bishop Steven, with music from the Frideswide Consort Girls' Choir, newly established as at the cathedral.

The whole event was all amazingly well planned and meaningful – and will likely be repeated next year.



Part-time disciples?

Last year, as part of my work with the Anglican Communion, I visited a vicar near Coventry. During the conversation sitting over a coffee on her sunny patio she asked me, "So what are you doing now with the Anglican Communion Office?" I replied, "Most of my work there is on discipleship, following Jesus and how this works out in different contexts and countries." As I sipped my coffee, her eyes lit up and she said, "Oh yes, we did Discipleship here at St. Jude's two years ago. This year we are doing the Environment." That was the beginning of a very long conversation!

Many of us make the same mistake as my vicar friend in Warwickshire. We participate in a 'Discipleship' course and then we move on. It feels as if we can tick that box even if we did not get a certificate at the end of the course. But discipleship is not like that, it's not a course we can complete but rather a 'way of life'. When you get married you do not agree to go on a ten week, or even a ten month, course with your spouse and then move on to something, or someone, else. Marriage is a life-long commitment or venture and discipleship is the same, it is about a relationship which goes on for the rest of life – for life eternal!

In the work I am doing with Anglican churches around the world we talk about 'whole-life discipleship'. This does not just mean discipleship that goes on until the day we die, and beyond. It also means that discipleship affects every aspect of our life – our home life, our relationships with family, what we do at work, how we use our leisure time and even how we vote. We use the slogan Jesus-shaped Life. One of the biggest challenges for Christian communities around the world is that so many of us live Jesus-shaped lives at church on Sunday, at our



home group and while we study the Bible at home but as soon as we step into the workplace, take a night out with our friends, or have to deal with a difficult relative we become very 'Not-Jesus-Shaped'. The most extreme example of this took place in Rwanda in 1994. At the time around 92% of the population of Rwanda were Christians attending church each week but despite this we saw a genocide during which Christians attacked Christians and at least half a million people died. They were 'Jesus-Shaped' in church but when it came to community and political issues it was tribalism, anger and violence that shaped them. So what about us? How Jesus-shaped are we?

One of the privileges I have had is to act as editor for a new 'Life Guide' for those of us who want to follow Jesus in every part of our lives – to be truly Jesus-Shaped. Written by 11 different authors from many different counties (including Bishop Stephen Cottrell who you may remember was bishop of Reading a few years ago) the Life Guide has 12 sessions covering topics such as discipleship at work, in the family, transforming communities and amongst people of other faiths. I hope that at some stage next year we will be able to use this international life guide within this parish.

But in the meantime, ask yourself, "At each moment of this day, am I living a Jesus-Shaped Life?"

This year AFIA managed to send nine families, with young children, on holiday which would have been outside their financial reach. At the AGM one talented member had donated an exquisite white baby shawl which she had knitted to be raffled in aid of AFIA. Well, we were thrilled when Marion Webster's (one of our members) ticket was drawn out. She is an elderly lady and has generously offered to pass it on to anyone in our parish who is expecting or has just given birth to a new baby. 

OPEN THE BOOK is 20 years old this year

In 1999 a small group of church volunteers started going into primary school assemblies in Bedford to read and act out stories using *The Lion Storyteller Bible*. After being inspired by the idea, the project spread into Gloucestershire in 2001.....and further. Later, in 2007, a national charity was formed. With the increasing growth of volunteer numbers into the thousands, OtB joined the Bible Society in 2013 and is now an international scheme.



There have been celebration services around the country, organised by the national Open the Book team, based with the Bible Society in Swindon. At St James and St Francis, we celebrated on Bible Sunday, 27th October, telling the story of the prophet Elijah, fed by ravens in the desert, and singing 'happy birthday to you, Open the Book' with a 20 candle cake. Our story tellers were also recommissioned.

We will be celebrating with the schools on our first storytelling visit in November.

For I know the plans I have for you (Jeremiah 29-11)

It was around ten years ago while at work I was talking to the wife of a patient who had recently passed away. As the conversation flowed, the topic of faith popped up. I can still remember a wave of warmth appear over her face as she remembered her husband saying 'If you ever want to make God laugh, tell him your plans'. At the time I'd never heard of anything like that before and it has stuck with me ever since.

My husband Duncan regularly has to tell me when I'm trying to process the reasoning of events in life, exclaiming 'but why has that happened?' that we may not know the answer yet or, the line I'm not so keen on, that we may not ever know the reason. Of course the only one who does know the answer, is God.

I was passing the time waiting for the spin cycle to finish on the washing machine the other day, looking out of the window onto the garden. I noticed something small and dark hanging from our children's play house. It wasn't a particularly windy day but the unknown 'thing' appeared to be dangling and swinging in its own non-existent breeze.

I had to concentrate for a while to notice the 'thing' was actually a Daddy long legs (or crane fly for its 'proper' name?) stuck in a spiders web. I watched as it used momentum from the web, looking like a clip from the 'hanging rings' event on the old TV show 'Gladiators', to gain enough swing to escape.

Following an array of Tarzan antics, suddenly something flew from the web and I noticed the Daddy long legs had escaped. I was joyous for its victory! Quickly the thoughts of 'Yay! Never give up!' came to mind as I watched it merrily back on its way hovering over the house. Alas, the freedom was to be short lived. As quick as it had escaped, the Daddy long legs had managed to meander its way straight into another web. The new spider appeared from nowhere, whizzing its way down the web at super speed and quickly putting a stop to the Daddy long legs wriggling.

By this point, the washing in the machine had long stopped whirring but my mind was quite the opposite. The victorious feeling had quickly changed to deflation and I was stood thinking there must be some kind of life lesson to learn from what I had just witnessed. There had to be. Should I have intervened? Gone out there and interfered with what I would be told by others as 'just nature'? I thought of the first spider missing out on its lunch, the second spider taking advantage of an already bruised and weak victim, the Daddy long legs' silliness of falling into the exact same trap it had only moments before escaped. I was clearly thinking far too much about this when I had washing to sort!

Throughout the day I kept thinking back to it and what the 'lesson' was. When you're feeling helpless and you think that's it, you may get a second chance? If you mess up, be careful not to follow the same path again or you might not be so lucky next time?

I talked about it the following day at the church group ReFresh, laughing at my peculiar ramblings that wander through my head and my need to have an answer for it all.

I was back looking out on the garden later that day while preparing lunch and the thought of plans came into my head, followed by the conversation with the recently widowed lady. Maybe, as ever, I was throwing too many demands for a written in stone reason for something that I wasn't going to get.

Maybe it wasn't some complicated and deep meaningful answer after all. Maybe it was just the plan. That no matter how much free will we have in life to make the choices to paddle one way or the other down the stream of life, or to choose which rocks to battle to swerve out of the way of on the way down, the current will always be there to decide the path we take. The 'current' being God. The one who has written the plans for us and the one who 'knows the plans I have for you'. I think I'm content(ish!) with that 'written in stone' answer.

The memory of the conversation I had years ago with that lady has stuck with me and I think the thoughts of the Daddy Long Legs vs The Spiders will be joining it too!



Keep Your Home Safe - Burglars are often opportunistic thieves who prey on houses and flats. They seek out any opening that they can take advantage of, specifically doors and windows that are left open or unlocked or are easy to force. Anything of value that they might spot through a window will only spur them on. But it really doesn't take much to deter these thieves – just smart thinking.

Burglar facts


- Burglars target homes that they think will contain valuables. A sure giveaway is leaving packaging from expensive items outside your front door.
- Burglars often look for homes with windows or doors left open or with vulnerable features that they can exploit.
- Burglars are aware of the times when someone is expected to be away from their house such as during the school run or holidays.
- Burglars typically do not want to be seen or heard and if they feel that they would be noticed by a neighbour or passer-by then they are more likely to feel exposed and may move on to find somewhere else to burgle.
- Burglars often choose a home because they've spotted a specific vehicle, motorcycle or bicycle they want to steal – and the keys are more than likely to be inside the residence.
- Sheds and garages are often vulnerable as they are not that secure and contain tools which the burglar can use to assist them to gain entry to a home.

It's a fact that many burglars return to homes that they've previously burgled because the homeowner failed to upgrade security following the first burglary. They sometimes return to an area to try to burgle a nearby home that they spotted while committing a previous break in . Even more reason for you to ensure you keep your home as safe as houses.

COURAGE REWARDED



Remember the explosion at a Littlemore council house a year ago? Among the three men recently awarded the Queen's Commendation for brave conduct for their part in the rescue operation was P.C. David Dutson, of Paget Road, Cowley.

P.C. Dutson arrived at the house in his patrol car just as the explosion occurred. "It was just like a Roman candle, with flames shooting up some 50 to 60 feet", he said. The ground floor walls were blown right out, bringing the upstairs floor crashing to the ground.

Together with Det. Constable Ron Orman, also of Cowley Police Station, P.C. Dutson dashed into the wrecked house, now burning fiercely, to try to find the children known to be inside.

"Almost the first thing I saw was a shape, in a bed, that looked like one of the children. It turned out to be a giant teddy bear", he said. However, he then saw a leg and an arm sticking out from under the rubble of the roof, and by holding up the roof beam together with his companions, first one child, then another, discovered lower down, were dragged clear.

Meanwhile, a van belonging to Mr. Molloy, the explosives expert who blew himself up, was standing near the gate, with its engine running, and 200lbs. of gelnite inside, which it was feared would go up at any moment.

This was the real danger with which P.C. Dutson and the other two men, having evacuated the other inhabitants of Alice Smith Square, had to cope. It was only after all the family had been miraculously rescued that bomb disposal experts arrived on the scene to render the explosives safe. The picture shows P.C. When I was a little girl I had a best friend called Margaret. She had a big brother who was a rear-gunner in Lancaster bombers in the Second World War. He loved getting letters when he was posted away from home so my mum suggested that when Margaret came round to play or have tea that we should write him little letters telling him news of our village. He wrote lovely letters back.

Being romantic little girls with heads full of happy-ever-after fairy stories we thought it wonderful when, on leave, John brought a rather beautiful girl-friend home to meet his family. We got even more excited when in a short while they returned and she was wearing an engagement ring.

John and his beautiful girl were married (because of the urgency of war) quite soon and he continued on his sorties into Germany with his Lancaster crew. One day Margaret came to school with the news that her new sister-in-law was expecting a baby and she was going to be an auntie.

However, a couple of months before the little girl was born a telegram was delivered to their home to say that John and his crew were "missing" believed dead, after one of their bombing raids over Germany. Both my parents and I were devastated so I cannot guess how John's family coped.

I don't know why but I remember the baby was christened Rosemary and all my life I have grieved the fact that she grew up never knowing her lovely daddy (especially as my relationship with my father was so special). Every Remembrance Sunday I think of her and of John and the many brave young men who gave up their lives to protect their country. And, of course, I pray for them.

A few years ago I wrote a poem on behalf of Rosemary trying to imagine how she grew up. I called it My Dad and I thought you might like to share it on Remembrance Day. It's Rosemary's dad (not mine) of course.
