

## CHILDREN'S CORNER

I suppose you expect me to want to talk about Halloween or Bonfire Night or something like that at this time of year but you see I don't know much about Halloween and although I enjoy fireworks and especially bonfires, Halloween didn't exist over this side of the Atlantic and we seldom had much pocket money available for much more than sparklers! But we did have fun. There is something common to both dates that I find a bit sad. Neither celebration is what I would call HAPPY and although Halloween is supposed to be a surprise, I usually find it scary and NOT happy. Both can cause you to spend an awful lot of money and the fun that lasts for a very short time. I think neither has the 'magic' that I want to tell you about.

For the same price as a small box of fireworks or a ghastly scary facemask and hat you can buy a bag of bulbs that will not only give joy to you and everyone who sees them, but is your own small contribution to the magic of life. What appears to be a bundle of scrappy small onions, with a marvellous picture of some flowers on its packaging, will grow over the winter period in the garden or in a bowl inside the house. All you have to do is get a small pack of compost from the hardware store, or ask your parents to let you have a little of their supplies. By planting the bulbs in a bowl or in a vacant part of your garden you will have flowers in the spring. But you have to be patient and leave the bulbs alone. There will be some sign of life after Christmas with slow growth until the flowers form from buds at the end of the stalk.

Or, if you want to be very grown up, ask your parents if you can try to grow some small plants yourself from cuttings in your garden that they will be pruning, like giving the plant a haircut. Then, replant those cuttings in a

vacant spot in the garden. Don't expect every cutting to 'root', but some will and later you will be able to swap spares with your friends. Later with the success, and hopefully encouragement that you now have 'green fingers' you will want to prepare your pots and trays for sowings seeds in the spring so that you can have even more flowers during other months of next year. You might even grow some plants for the summer sale.

Left alone on the shelves in the hardware store the bulbs and seeds will be just that, bulbs and seeds. They remain dead or sleeping. With a little help from you, a small addition of compost (or fine soil from the garden with no stones or weeds, AND a little patience), you will have your own bit of magic for all to see and enjoy. Try it yourself. You can ALL do this sort of magic. The first time it IS a surprise that I am sure you will find exciting, and so too will be the gift of a bowl of lovely flowering bulbs to your mum or dad. THAT'S MAGIC.

## **NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH**

Neighbourhood Watch is a free service available to help reduce crime in Oxford by promoting community spirit and maintaining links with the Police. The vision is a society where neighbour come together to create safer, stronger and active communities.

By supporting and enabling individuals and communities to be connected, active and safe, this will increase wellbeing and minimise crime. In a study in June 2019 by Nottingham University, roads that had Watch schemes had 11% lower crime rates.

Local information and crime reduction advice is shared within a Watch scheme.

Watch groups can be as small as five houses or as large as a couple of streets. A great deal can k done to prevent crime but the Police cannot do it alone.

You can be a member or Co-ordinator for your road. There are Neighbourhood Watch discount for local and national shops.

# Top tips for savings and stress-free Christmas preparations

It's that time of year when Christmas adverts start appearing on our TVs. Constant images of festive flawlessness aimed at getting us all to feel inadequate, and thus part with our money and achieve the 'perfect' Christmas bother me. Bah humbug.

For Christians, preparing to celebrate the birth of Jesus is exciting, but there is a lot of pressure from our culture today about what Christmas should look like. This can cause family tensions and financial pressures ('If I invite my sister to lunch, I should invite my brother - who my sister doesn't get on with.' 'I've spent this much on Cousin John, so I must spend the same amount on Cousins Jack, Jane and Joe too.')

Here are a few small ideas to save on money and stress:

As members of a busy church family, we have lots of people who we will want to wish a Very Merry Christmas: our nearest and dearest, and of course our brothers and sisters we worship and meet with each week.

Last year this left me with a dilemma. Now I love sending and receiving Christmas cards. But I worked out that as a minister in the parish, I engage with over a thousand people each week. I don't have the time or the money to send everyone a card, and inevitably I'd miss someone out! So I ended up not sending any, and felt very Scrooge-like about it.

This year Geoff has had an excellent idea for sending church Christmas cards. In St James and



St Francis we will be installing large display boards for Christmas cards which are sent to the whole congregation. This means that we can send just a single card to send Christmas blessings and peace to all our fellow brothers and sisters, saving money, time and our planet! Keep this in mind as you do your Christmas shopping.

Another good tip is to wrap any gifts in brown paper. It is recyclable where gift wrapping paper is not. It's also much cheaper!

This year I have also come across a brilliant idea for giving gifts. There have been years past in our household with three daughters that ,come Christmas morning, we couldn't see the floor for

presents. Sometimes it feels like it all gets a bit out of hand, financially and materially - do we really need this much

stuff?! Recently I saw a fantastic idea of using three boxes to give presents in – a large one for a big toy, a medium one for clothes, and a small one for sweets and chocolates. They can be decorated and stacked to look like snowmen, Father Christmas, etc, and if you're feeling extra generous can be holding an envelope containing money or vouchers.



When preparing for celebrating Emmanuel - God with us - I pray that we would remember that in the bible, the main characteristic of those preparing to meet the baby Jesus was obedience and a willingness to say Yes to God.

# Citizens Advice launches energy advice drive

Your local Citizens Advice is launching its annual initiative to help people in financial need who find it hard to pay their energy bills.

The project, called the Energy Advice Programme (EAP), is going live throughout Oxfordshire South and Vale from October to March 2020. It includes comprehensive steps to help people who have to spend a significant proportion of their income on fuel bills.

At an EAP appointment our advisers, depending on your particular problem, can do one or more of the following:

- Help you understand energy companies' tariffs and bills.
- Provide information and support on switching tariff or supplier, identifying any savings you might make.
- Give advice on energy efficiency measures and list any grants available to pay for these.
- Carry out benefit entitlement checks and help you claim any benefits to which you
  might be entitled. We can help you apply for the Warm Home Discount and the
  Priority Services Register, if applicable.
- Assist with any customer service complaints you might have against your energy company.


have never seen it it is a must-see story.

## **INTRODUCTION** (an extract)

CHURCH HOUSE INTRODUCTION The first followers of Jesus often scrawled the



symbol of a fish on the wall of their house. They were not just identifying themselves as Christians – albeit secretly – they were declaring the Christian faith itself. Five letters make up the Greek word for fish: icthus. Each is the first letter of one of the earliest creeds spelling the declaration: Jesus Christ, God's Son, Saviour. There are others scattered through the New Testament.

The first apostles handed on the heart of the faith in short, memorable ways often using a question-and-answer format. In

the early Church this process of formation for baptism and for life long discipleship was called 'catechesis' (pronounced cat-eh-key-sis). The aim is to build a resounding inner echo of God's word, an image of Christ at the centre of each disciple's life through learning very simple core texts by heart.

From earliest times the Apostles' Creed and the Lord's Prayer formed the basis of what became known as a catechism: a simple and compelling way of forming disciples in the Christian faith and helping them to live out that faith with joy.

The Commandments and the Beatitudes were also used from earliest times. The catechism in the Book of Common Prayer is the best known example in the Anglican tradition.

This new Pilgrim catechism - The Pilgrim Way - stands in this great tradition, consciously drawing on all that has gone before. It also offers something new for today's generation of Christians, helping us to understand and live out our faith and identity as followers of Jesus Christ. It is offered as a resource to help Christian people understand and grow in their faith in the conviction that the renewal and revival of catechesis is urgently needed in today's Church. Like the very first Christians we too must know, and understand, and share and live out our faith each day.



#### **RECIPES**

We are sure you are busy preparing Christmas cakes and Christmas puddings, so only one recipe this month!



The following recipe is from Cakes, Bakes, Puddings and Prayers by Susan Over:

**Coventry God Cakes (makes 12)** 

### Ingredients:

500g (1lb 2oz) ready-made puff pastry 50g (2oz) butter 275g (10oz) mixed dried fruit 1 heaped teaspoon mixed spice ½ teaspoon ground cinnamon 50g (2oz) demerara sugar 1 tablespoon brandy Egg white and caster sugar for glaze

#### Method:

- 1. Preheat oven to gas mark 3/220° C/425° F
- 2. Roll pastry to approximate thickness of a 2p piece. Cut into 12 squares.
- 3. Melt butter and add fruit, spices, sugar and brandy, mix well.
- 4. Place a dessertspoonful of mixture on

- each pastry shape and fold to make triangles, damping edges with water to seal.
- 5. Place on lightly greased baking tray, flattening slightly, and make short cut in top of each to allow steam to escape.
- 6. Brush with lightly beaten egg white and sprinkle with sugar.
- 7. Bake for about 10 minutes until golden.
- 8., Cool on tray for a few minutes then finish on wire rack.

## SAFEGUARDING IN COWLEY PARISH

As a Parish, we are committed to the Christian care, nurture of, and respectful pastoral ministry with, all children and all adults but particularly those who are vulnerable in any way.

So we ensure that our policies and practice on the selection and training of all those staff and volunteers with any responsibility within the Church are in line with safer recruitment principles, including the use of Disclosure and Barring Service criminal records checks where applicable.

We intend that St James and St Francis churches will be safe, caring communities which provide a loving environment where there is a culture of 'informed vigilance' as to the dangers of abuse, including domestic violence.

We will challenge any abuse of power, especially by anyone in a position of trust.

We follow statute, guidance and recognised good practice in all our safeguarding practice and check that all users of our premises do so too.

Role descriptions: Because we are starting from scratch on this, everyone who is a volunteer in the life of the Parish will, in the next couple of weeks, receive, by hand or e-mail, a role description pro forma asking you to please write in all that you believe your role involves and return it to Lesley Williams to formalise, type up and sign. It's not bureaucracy gone mad; it's responding to the need to clarify everyone's responsibilities and their 'supervisor' or point of contact.

#### DEDICATION WEEK UP AT ST. FRANCIS'

The first week in October was a very happy and busy one for people at St. Francis'. The Bishop of Oxford came to Dedicate the Church on Monday. This was a very joyful occasion. We managed to squeeze in two hundred and sixty people and what a thrill to hear the trumpets in the Church! These were provided by the Oxford & Bucks Light Infantry and really added to the occasion. They seem to bring out the primitive in man.

The Bishop went round the Church and dedicated the various parts of the Church and then re-consecrated the Altar. After the Bishop's Sermon we all went round to the Hall and there the Bishop cut the 'Dedication' cake. The refreshments were excellent and a happy time was had by all. On St. Francis' Day over twenty people came to the 6.00am Sung Eucharist and gathered for Breakfast afterwards.

At Evensong on St. Francis' Day over sixty people came and heard Father Malton, Priest-Missioner of Blackbird Leys, preach on Poverty. The great joy of this service came out in the singing.



All at St. Francis' wish to thank all those who helped to make our Festival such a joyful and happy occasion. Also, our thanks to all at St. Francis' who worked so hard to make this such a memorable occasion.

Sangeeta spoke to the children in assembly about her school and spent some time observing learning in our


classrooms. We discussed the possibility of both our schools building a link with each other, through 'pen pals' and communication with staff. This would be very exciting for us to build a global link like this with another school. We also discussed how it would be lovely to sponsor one or two children in her school. The cost for this would be £130 for each child we sponsor, which we could raise through cake sales, and other fund-raising activities. We would get regular updates and photos of the children we sponsor, which we think our children would enjoy, and help them to understand about education in another country.

The children have already been busy thinking about others this term and supporting some charities. We raised £220 for

Macmillan Cancer with a cake sale after school. For our Harvest assembly we collected a load of food items for the foodbank at St Francis' Church. Also, thanks to everyone who donated on the World Mental Health Awareness day for the charity Young Minds. We raised just under £100 and everyone in the school accessorised their uniform for the day with a yellow item to help raise awareness of mental health issues. Next term we will be supporting BBC Children In Need.

We have already been involved in local school sports' events. Over 30 children took part in the level 2 City Cross-Country races at Oxford Spires
Academy, and both of our Year 5 classes took part in the tag rugby festival, also at Oxford Spires. Two of our Year 6 boys have now been selected to play football for the District U11 team – well done Ahmed and Ivan!

## Colourful trees and parrots!

Ruth and I meet once a year. This year I was hosting in Oxford and in alternate years, it is me going north to Nottingham where Ruth lives. We met on our first day at University long ago in the mists of time! We were placed in a Victorian house which was part of the Hall of Residence. I shared a room on the ground floor and Ruth had her own room two floors up. Here we would play the only record she had, which was the Paul Simon Songbook, on her Dansette record player. (Remember them?) She studied social sciences and went on to the Civil Service and then to train as a Primary School teacher.

We are both keen on gardens and gardening so we usually arrange our visits around gardens that are open or attached to a National Trust property. Ruth volunteers at National Trust Calke Abbey garden in Derbyshire. We usually meet sometime in summer but this year it was a late October date because it was the only Open Day at Thenford that fitted with our schedules.

I had been to Thenford three or four years ago when I went on a visit organised by the Friends of the Oxford Botanical Garden. I was bowled over with how wonderful it was so I thought Ruth would love it too. Classically-Georgian Thenford House, built in 1760, is owned by Lord Michael Heseltine and his wife Anne. Purchased in 1975, they have worked on the near derelict woodland and neglected walled garden to produce the elegant 70 acres of garden and arboretum there today. They produced a book describing this in 2016 and I went to a talk by them about it at the Oxford Literary Festival the following year.

The weather forecast was rain and we had

had some heavy rain leading up to the visit, so both Ruth and I had brought our wellies. Happily the rain stayed off but our wellies were very useful on some muddy ground. The sun didn't shine but the autumn colours certainly did. There are over 3,500 different trees and shrubs and the Japanese maples were spectacular.

The walled garden is divided from corner to orner into quarters and not one is the same. In one, an aviary contains strikingly-coloured parrots! We couldn't help but stand and watch them. There were even some vegetables as well as a fruit cage and step-over apples marking the boundaries. In another sector were black square pools and in another, crisply manicured box-hedging parterres.

A sculpture garden, created with yew hedges, contains modern pieces. The largest is a huge bronze bust of Lenin that apparently was taken down at the end of communism in Latvia and made its way to the UK where Anne Heseltine bought it for £20,000! Other statuary is placed all over the garden both classical and modern. I loved the graceful swans in the front lawn and the half life-sized fallen soldiers in medieval-type armour.

Water plays a big role in that there is a formal rill edged with an avenue of conical yew trees which leads down to a natural valley and then onto several lakes.

The garden is only open a few days in the year for which you need to apply to visit. I would love to go again in February when the snowdrops are out and for which this garden is renowned, but we do our best in Cowley, don't we?
