Yes, sometimes birth takes place at home but still a midwife is usually present. Just occasionally a baby is born in an unexpected place. The headline at the top of this page is one of many examples I found when surfing the internet of babies born in unexpected places.



Jesus (John 3: 3), as he talks to a man named Nick, says these words. "I assure you, that unless a man is born from water and from spirit he cannot enter the kingdom of God." FROM THE ARCHIVES

COWLEY CHURCH & HOME MAGAZINE

October 1893

Extract from sermon preached by the Vicar, Rev. G. Moore, M.A., on Thirteenth Sunday after Trinity:

....."Many that are first shall be last, and the last shall be first." – Matthew xix. 30.

In our day we have the difficulty placed before our eyes with an astonishing force. Our country is, as far as we can see at present, to be ruled in every detail by the majority. Things which were held to be quite out of the reach of the government are now not only to be examined, but a powerful section of the community say that they shall be overhauled and used according to the will of the greater number.

Now these new apostles do not, as a rule, throw aside Christianity; some do, and with this section it is not difficult to contend, but I wish to confine my remarks to those who profess the doctrines of Christ and who possess their power from those amongst us who are either indifferent in this matter, or are ignorant, or come in the category of which I have been speaking: this last section is described as Hypocrites.

To make my point clear, let me give an instance – it shall be the action of the Local Authority in the parish of St. Pancras, London. For centuries in this country the burial places of the dead have always held a place of reverence and respect in the hearts of our countrymen. We have all been taught to respect death, to respect the place of the dead, and I suppose every person has an instinct of reverence for the spot where the bodies of his friends rest. Now, what has been the case of the parish I have mentioned? The Churchyard, like many others, has been closed for want of space for some years. After it had been closed an application was made to run the railway through, and this, unfortunately, in my opinion, was allowed to be done. On three grounds, reason, in my opinion, refuses to

acknowledge that this step was wise.

- (1) A railway is merely a machine for accommodation and making money, and there are circumstances which, in my opinion, ought to check both these.
- (2) This said railway is a common nuisance to the worshippers of the Church.
- (3) When the body is buried most exceptional reasons ought to exist before it is disturbed.

The Local Authority first acquired one section of power after another, partly, no doubt, through the concession of those who are the lawful guardians of our churchyards. The churchyards are in the keeping of the Vicars and Rectors of the parishes in this country; they are for all practical purposes the freehold of the clergyman. The parishioners have their rights, but they are carefully defined – so that if a clergyman holds firmly to his duty there is little risk of the thing happening which I am now discussing. But it is the moral weight brought by these new apostles which creates this state of things. I need not examine their arguments, because in my opinion the facts I have stated clear up any difficulty that might arise when those argument are alleged. The Local Authority of St. Pancras have gone on from point to point, as they say for the good of the masses, till at last they settled some months ago, without any reference to the Rector of the parish, to erect a large bandstand in the middle of the churchyard – that a band might be engaged to play in this consecrated ground.

The Rector, thank God! Has had the courage to go to law, and he has won his case; this Local

Authority must now pull down this stand and restore the ground to its former state. But is this fair? Is it fair for one man to take up the axe against a body which are said to represent the inhabitants of this parish? These men have not had to pay a penny of their own money, they have struck a rate to meet this wicked folly. The Rector has not only had to endure all that is disagreeable to a Christian and an educated man, but he has had to find probably not less than £200.

Now, if these men had been obliged to find the money either for the stand itself or the defence, they would have given no trouble; they would have gone, leaving their places void.

But there is another sad aspect to this question; it is the hypocrisy which in my opinion rests beneath the whole business. These men, or at least the active part of them, hate religion, hate the Church, hate every honest clergyman. They are hypocrites when they wish to attach religion to their conduct.

Now in cases of this kind the law is more certain to be administered fairly; it was merely a question of law, and therefore it was decided by

judges, not by jurymen.

Jurymen have to do with facts only, no person's character is safe, in my opinion, in their hands. But up to the present in this country the law is administered by judges, by men of education, of character and honesty.

What did the judge say? He had, he said, merely to decide what the law said, and the stand must be taken down, but he could not close his eyes to what might happen if the stand was allowed to remain. The band would play, and at certain times in the week persons exasperated by drink would be drawn from the public-house, and might dance over the bodies of the dead.

I need not pursue this point further. I have said sufficient to prove what in my opinion is creating a danger in our day – a danger to religion, a danger to morality, a danger to the young.

I have tried to draw your attention to one danger caused by the new state of things under which we live. Be on your watch, and do your best to arrest this evil.

The changing seasons keep us busy in the garden

This time of the year it is noticeable that the morning dew lasts longer and even stays all day when we get cloudy and still conditions and the days get shorter. Getting out in the garden or allotment has to be whenever conditions allow.

It is a time for clearing out spent annuals in the borders and planting bulbs for the spring in their place. I love daffodils and intend to put in as many as possible in my back border which, until last winter, was occupied solely by an overgrown laurel hedge (and the accompanying bindweed!). I will also put in tulips. Both daffs and tulips will be the tall varieties so we can see them from the house. The tulips will be red as I am not fond of any other colour, and the daffs, the traditional yellow trumpets. Before I get on with clearing I shall be collecting as much seed as possible as well as shaking it out of the plants as well. I don't intend adding any more annual seeds as I hope they will regenerate themselves.

The Californian poppies were a joy, as were the calendulas, cornflowers, echiums, sunflowers, sweet peas and agastache. All designed to attract insects. A favourite still in flower, as are the asters and zinnias, and will continue to do so, is cosmos. Bright pinks and whites on top of tall stems, they bob about cheerfully in the breeze and add to the colourful range of flowers I have had this year. Deadheading regularly keeps them flowering. My dahlias are another story. They have sulked all year with two not having any flowers at all. They

survived the mild winter and were late to get going and have not produced any of the incredible growth that I saw last year. I am presuming that they have used up the nutrients in the new border so I will dress them with some fertiliser and compost this autumn and hope for the best for next year. Just coming into flower are the Michaelmas daisies and, waiting in the wings are the spray chrysanthemums. The borders have been colourful all year and much, much more uplifting than the boring shrubbery I had before.

Tidying up the allotment is also a seasonal job. Harvesting the potatoes and cutting down the runner beans and their support and chopping off spent broad beans and peas, pulling up sweet corn and courgette plants all produces a lot of top growth. This is left to dry and then we usually have a bonfire of it. You can compost this material, except the potato haulms that may carry disease, but it is bulky stuff and it is just good to have a cleansing fire of it all. The problem is that you have to wait until the stuff is perfectly dry and then get the job done. There may be a problem this year as the powers -that -be have imposed days and times when we can only have that blaze. The new regulations are a bit like waiting for the third Tuesday after a new moon but only when there is an R in the month! The arrival of the correct day will probably not coincide with the pile being dry. Life is never simple!



CHURCHES WITHIN OUR DEANERY

St Andrew's Church, Headington



This church is the oldest surviving building in Headington, being built around 1160 in the Norman style and is currently a Grade II listed building.

King Ethelred is thought to have been christened on this site and Saint Frideswide may also have worshipped here in perhaps an early timber church, her childhood being spent in Headington.

The only part of this church remaining from the original date is the Chancel Archway, other parts being added over the centuries. It has a South Aisle from the 13th century, windows in the north and south Chancel walls which date from the 14th century, a Tower which was finished around 1500 and a South Porch built in 1596. In 1862 J. C. Buckler lengthened the Nave.

It is a large, handsome airy church exuding peace and tranquillity, with some glorious stained glass windows.

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Deanery Synod Meeting, 16 May 2016

The theme of the evening was Mission and Exploring the Ideas of Welcoming, and there were three interesting and useful presentations:

1. **Everyone Welcome:** In the presentation it was indicated that many people try church but statistically only 10% come back. It is therefore necessary to transform your church through welcoming. The course has five main sessions.
 - Making the Church more visible
 - Make the premises more inviting
 - Welcoming God, Welcoming People
 - Community
 - Training a welcoming team
2. **"Who is Welcome in Your Congregation?":** A nine week programme. Its main theme is making the Church more inviting and it also covers subjects such as Back to Church Sunday. The course contains sections on:
 - Building a team
 - Characteristics of a healthy congregation
 - Norms
 - Caring for volunteers
 - Ways of welcoming.

Statistically people came to church because of the following promotional methods:

- 2% Adverts
- 6% Invite from Clergy
- 6% Evangelism
- 86% Personal invitation

The reasons people came to church were statistically:

- 50% just moved into the area
- 10% married
- 40% recent life crisis or transition

Introverts and extroverts experienced their first Sundays differently and many newcomers reacted well to being contacted after the event. It is important also to track attendance patterns. If a person is away for 2 – 3 months it becomes a habit that they may struggle to break. Unfortunately it was also shown that 80 – 95% of congregation members have little intention of inviting others to church. But 6 months after being invited to Back to Church Sunday 12 % were regular attendees.

3. **"The Family Welcome Award":** Its goal is to help us think about how we are inviting people along and how we are becoming more family friendly. Its goal is to help us think about:
 - Where we are now
 - Where do we want to be
 - What do we need to do
 - What will help us
 - Are we getting there

Here are their accounts:

Dave Stanley: For this year, my plans were made to cycle into the beautiful Oxfordshire countryside. However the weather forecast was grim. After donning full waterproofs and delaying for as long as possible, eating cake at first base, St James Church, a gingerly start was made to Smith and Low to pick up florescent yellow trouser clips. The Ride and Stride sticker had already detached itself in the rain by then! Each church visited became a welcome beacon of refuge from the elements and a chance to renew energy. Just after stopping at St Nicholas, Forest Hill, my trusty bike started to

make some disturbing clicking noises. Loath to turn back now that the open countryside had been reached, I continued. Islip beckoned ahead but caution and a steady downpour took the better part of valour and I backtracked to Oxford via the church of the Holy Rood, Woodeaton, built 1250 AD, featuring ancient oak pews and welcome juice and biscuits, left out for the sole St/rider of the day! St Nicholas Orthodox church in Ferry Road was open for the first time to st/riders and had beautiful wall paintings and icons.

Finally, the excellent Reg Taylor bike shop on Iffley Road confirmed broken front wheel bearings - which reminds me now to collect the repaired bike!

Eight churches visited in all and a great, wet sense of satisfaction.

John Booty: It took a while to dry out .. the wet weather meant I left the bike at home and walked instead, heading down the Iffley and Cowley Roads. I really enjoyed visiting the fascinating Bartlemas Chapel, built for a fourteenth century leper hospital. I bought a leaflet about its interesting history. Ride and Stride is such a good event for getting to places you would not usually visit - 7 churches in my case.

Lesley Williams: My proposed ride became an enforced stride when my bike was stolen from outside my flat on the previous Tuesday evening - may it be a blessing to whoever has it now.

Like John, I headed for town fully waterproofed, where I could 'collect' most churches within a relatively small area. As usual, I bent the rules a

little by visiting the College chapels that were open for Open Doors weekend – that included several I had not seen before – Brasenose, Trinity, University College.... so in 3.5h I managed 25. That was 3hr striding; then the matinee of 'Glasgow Girls' at the Oxford Playhouse (an absolutely brilliant retelling of a true story of schoolgirls who, guided by their teacher, fought a campaign in 2005 to stop one of their asylum seeker friends being returned to Kosovo – a very moving message about our attitude to the refugee issue), followed by an extra

half hour up St Giles to Blackfriars, The Friends Meeting House and St Giles church - my legs would have allowed more – I really wanted to see the Keble 'Light of the World' again - but the colleges were then closed.

I'm now having to decide whether I pay up on the £5 per church I committed, expecting that 15 would be the maximum.....

RECIPE

Roasted autumn vegetables
with Lancashire cheese

(Serves 2 as main dish)

A colourful and hearty vegetarian supper dish for autumn – made in one roasting tin.



Ingredients:

1 large butternut squash (1lb 5oz – 1lb 9oz in weight)

1 medium red onion

6 tbsp olive oil

1 large sprig fresh sage

1 large courgette

1 tbsp balsamic or sherry vinegar

100 g Lancashire cheese

Method

Preheat the oven to fan180C/conventional 200C/ gas 6.

Using a sharp knife, cut the squash in half and scoop out the seeds. Cut the halves into smaller pieces so you can peel them more easily. Chop the flesh into big bite-sized pieces – they don't have to be neat.

Halve the onion and trim the root end leaving a little on to hold the segments together. Peel and then cut each half into four wedges. Scatter the squash and onion in a large roasting tin so they have plenty of room to roast, drizzle 5 tbsp of the oil over and toss together.

Strip the sage leaves from the stem and roughly chop – you should have about 2 tbsps. Scatter the sage over the vegetables and season.

Roast for 20 minutes, stirring once halfway through.

Meanwhile, slice the courgette thickly and toss with the remaining oil. Remove the roasting tin from the oven and push the partly cooked squash and onion to the side. Put the courgette slices flat on the base and season. Roast for a further 10 minutes, until all the vegetables are tender.

Remove tin from the oven, sprinkle the vinegar over the vegetables and toss. Crumble over the Lancashire cheese. Toss lightly so the cheese melts a little and serve.

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Home-Based practice in OX4

Community Emergency Food-bank (CEF) 2015/16

I am pleased to report that in the period as follows CEF:

- ◆ Has fed in excess of 3,000 impoverished people which is broadly similar to 2014/15
- ◆ Distributed 33,971 items of food,
- ◆ Works with 30 committed volunteers as well as extra help in times of warehouse overload and during our move ably helped by students from Christ Church College
- ◆ Continues to be linked with the Oxford Food-bank, and now provides fresh food for our clients in addition to our food parcels,
- ◆ Is linked with additional CEF café at Littlemore Baptist Church which opens between 10-11.30 on Thursdays,
- ◆ Ran a successful Poetry and Music evening in April 2015 and made £1,500
- ◆ A member of staff went on a sponsored walk from Brighton to London via the Isle of Wight and raised £4,947.
- ◆ After having received free warehouse accommodation over the past three years through the generosity of Neilson UK we had to move out as they were selling the site. We purchased and in February installed a large portable cabin at the back of St Francis Church at a cost of £33,000. Although this has been a large capital outlay we believe it far outweighs the cost of renting space in Oxford. It has already proved to be a huge asset to the smooth running of the foodbank
- ◆ The reasons why people resort to the services of CEF remain complex and varied: inter alia, gaps in benefit, coming out of prison, gambling, drugs and alcohol, divorce, desertion, and job loss remain obvious reasons.

An independent consultant was recently asked to review the operations of CEF and report to the Trustees. He concluded that "The Trustees and volunteers are highly committed, enjoying the informality and flexibility of CEF's working environment."


Film Club at the Centre
